PROTEIN FOODS

This week, in spite of the fact that pork is in abundance, you may expect to find other meats "specialized" as infrequently as pork.

Poultry holds steady in its position as one of the best protein budget balancers. Take your choice of chicken fryers or low-cost turkey.

4 to 8-lb. turkeys easily take to outdoor cooking. Just quarter or split them in half for cooking flat on the grill. The whole small turkey is ideal for rotisserie cooking. Of course, there's nothing more tasty than a large turkey done on a spit over charcoal heat... or roasted in the oven at low temperature (325° F.) until golden brown. If you choose an 18 to 20-lb. bird there will be plenty of juicy meat for dinner... with delicious leftovers.

White sea bass is the seafood of the month, says the Southern California Fisheries Association. Barracuda and swordfish to be featured also. Never "sell" fish short these warm summer days. Remember, fish cooks quickly, and provides your family with fine nourishment in a minimum of time. In fact, if you are really in a hurry, you might like white sea bass raw! We understand that among the Japanese it is a most popular fish for serving raw.

CITRUS FRUITS: Lemons and Valencia oranges in ample supply to fill needs. New crop Desert Valley Grapefruit making good progress, and winter crop oranges (navels) sizing up well.
