Claim as district chairman of Office Volunteers for the Centinela Valley-South Bay District of the American Cancer Society was announced yesterday by Society officials.

Herself a volunteer, Mrs. McClain will coordinate activities of the many ladies who donate one to two days a week in handling the various assignments at the Society's District Information Center, 426B E. Queen St. in Inglewood.

"We have some volunteers who come from as far as Rolling Hills," said Mrs. McClain.

"They feel the work they are able to do is so important that the distance doesn't seem to be a factor."

"MY JOB will be to interest people in all parts of the District to volunteer to help in the three-fold program of the Society. Help is needed in every phase of the work. Education programs, which are offered free of charge to requesting groups, would not be possible without volunteer help to stamp, address and mail literature; to catalog films; to keep booking records; to address and type information mailings and to correspond with officers of clubs and organizations.

"Even the service program of ACS, in which thousands of free surgical dressings are issued to cancer patients each month, would not be possible without volunteer help to handle the dressings inventory and to process requests received.

"During the coming year we will need the help of everyone. The public awareness of cancer is greatly increased at the present time and its demand for additional services can only be met with the help of volunteers. 
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
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
