



At Portuguese Bend Club

Horse Show For Children's Hospital Slated Sept. 26-27

Portuguese Bend National Horse Show, sponsored by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Committee for the Crippled Children's Hospital, will be held Sept. 26 and 27 at the Portuguese Bend Riding club, on Narcisse Dr. in Portuguese Bend. Mrs. Lowell Dryden and Mrs. Jack Davidson are serving as co-chairmen of the annual event.

Guests of honor will be the children who are former patients of the Children's Hospital. They will be hosted by junior members of the Peninsula Committee and will present trophies during the two-day event.

Special feature will be the appearance both days of the Onondarka Riders, who will perform intricate drill maneuvers and three foot jumps without the use of bridles or saddles. The 15-member team, composed of girls from ten to 19 years of age, who own and train their own horses, has appeared many times at the Los Angeles Coliseum Championship Rodeo, the Cow Palace in San Francisco, the Santa Barbara Horse Show and at many other major horse shows and rodeos throughout California and Arizona.

The 1959 Portuguese Bend show, accredited by the Na-

tional Horse Show of New York City, will be one of the top horse shows in California. Outstanding exhibitors will be among the 300 entrants. In the all-junior show on Saturday there will be three medal classes among the 17 classes competing. The winner of each medal class will be eligible to compete in the final competitions for the United States Championships to be held later in the year at Madison Square Gardens and the Cow Palace.

The Sunday Show will be an open show with 14 classes showing including a stake class, hunters, jumpers, two Shetland pony classes and a Shetland pony fancy turnout exhibition.

An exhibitors party is planned immediately following the courtyard will be decorated with garlands of flowers, candles and a replica of the blue seahorse that is the emblem of the show for Children's hospital. Mrs. Roy Seawright is serving as chairman.
