State Public School Program Is Biggest in the Nation—Richards

California's public school system will be greatly strengthened and improved by legislation enacted this year. During the 1959 regular session, a total of 622 bills were introduced on the subject of education. Of this number, 340 bills were approved by both houses and sent to the Governor. Education accounted for more than 112 per cent of the total of 5150 bills introduced on all subjects. At the present time our public school program is the biggest of any state in the nation.

THIS IS not only true of our present situation, but will probably remain so for some little time because of our rapidly expanding school population, for which plans must be made now. In another 10 years, for example, we expect to have more than 5,500,000 students in our primary and secondary schools, almost 2,000,000 more than we have today. This figure is all the more impressive in view of the fact that only eight of the 50 states can claim a population of 5,000,000 or more residents at the present time.

DURING THE past year alone more than 200,000 new students enrolled in these schools, and the number can be expected to increase progressively in each succeeding year. During the next 10 years more than 200,000 additional teachers must be hired to accommodate students from kindergarten through junior college. Of these, 138,000 will be needed to replace those who retire, resign or leave the teaching profession for other reasons. This means that some 20,000

new teachers must be hired each year, of whom 11,000 will be required for the elementary schools and the remainder for secondary grades. With these developments in mind, a first step taken by the 1959 Legislature was a complete revision of the State Education Code. The bill embodying this revision was the largest bill introduced in the session, and it was passed unanimously by both houses.

ALSO APPROVED unanimously by both houses was the bill providing for the apportionment of the State School Fund.

This bill, replacing the previous law which expired on June 30, provides for the distribution of a record total of over \$636,000,000 in state aid to local school districts, amounting to a net increase of more than \$25,000,000 for our schools during the current school year. Other legislation affected specific areas of our over-all school system, such as instructional services, student discipline, teachers' benefits, programs for the physically handicapped and the mentally retarded, and state and junior colleges.

It is a very large operation, and future legislatures will need to be equally alert to keep abreast of continuing developments.

Armed Forces


