

Camino Sets Fall Concert Plans

Plans for the fall concerts of El Camino College were announced today by Robert Haag, orchestra director, R. Neil Hill, a cappella choir director, and Crist Mikkelsen, community choir director.

The choral organizations and the orchestra will combine in a Christmas performance of Benjamin Britten's "St. Nicholas" cantata, a work based on legendary and historical incidents in the life of St. Nicholas during the early fourth century A.D.

The work has been performed rarely on the West Coast and this is believed to mark the second performance in Southern California since it was written in 1952. The choral music is some of the finest Britten has written, being a mixture of traditional and contemporary tonality. A tenor soloist and antiphonal singing are featured throughout.

Performance of this work, the Community Choir will present J. S. Bach's "For us a Child is Born," one of the master's finest shorter cantatas. Solo parts are for contralto, tenor, and bass voices.

The A capella choir will join with the vocal ensembles in presenting an afternoon program of traditional carols appealing to all ages. Both programs will take place Dec. 13 at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m.

Late registration for these classes is Sept. 15.

Report UCC To Commence Hydrogen Job

Reports that officials planned to break ground here Tuesday for the new liquid hydrogen plant to be built by the Union Carbide Co.'s Linde Co. division, were circulated through the city yesterday.

Announced earlier this year by Morse G. Dial, chairman of the board for Union Carbide, the plant, which will occupy a site adjacent to the city's UCC plant, will be designed to supply up to 3,300,000 tons of liquid hydrogen to the National Aeronautic and Space Administration each year.


