Skirt lengths remain about the same, two to three inches below the knee, in spite of early season word from abroad decreeing otherwise. A great deal of collar interest, some of small detachable fur pieces, is evident, with the ensemble, especially the jacket dress, very good this fall.

These highlights and other fashion notes for fall were learned from Mrs. Ralph "Tim" Moore, in discussing the styles to be shown at the Catholic Daughter of America fashion show next Monday, Sept. 21. The local Court St. Catherine is staging this parade of fashions at Nativity parish hall, beginning at 8:00 o'clock.

The suit is coming back "into its own," with lots of plaids and pleats in use. Surface fabrics, basket weaves and tweeds, are preferred rather than piece-dye; diagonal tweeds, mohair boucle, houndstooth and other hard fabrics are popular, according to Mrs. Moore.
