

## Voters Can Get Copies of Bills, But No Free Seeds, Chapel Says

If you want to obtain two free copies of any bill or law, write to the Legislative Bill Room, State Capitol, Sacramento 14, Calif., and give the number of the bill or law. A bill is always either an Assembly Bill or a Senate Bill and the designation is A.B. 123 or S.B. 456, as the case may be. If you want more than two copies, first get the two free copies, read them, be sure they are what you want, and then write to the Legislative Bill Room for a price on the number you want.

If a bill passes both houses of the Legislature and is signed by the Governor, it then becomes a law, also known as a statute, and has an additional citation with a "Chapter" number.

IF YOU know the original Assembly or Senate Bill number, this is sufficient to ask the Bill Room for the new law and they will know how to find it.

However, if you do not know the number of the bill, whether it originated in the Assembly or the Senate, the Chapter number, or anything else that will enable the Bill Room to find it easily, then you write to me at Post Office Box 777, Inglewood 5, Calif., and give me as much of the following information as you can: (1) Subject matter, such as vaccinating cats; (2) Whether or not you read in the newspapers that the Governor signed the bill or vetoed it; and (3) anything else that will enable me to dig it up.

Then I must go to work personally and possibly spend

many hours trying to decipher the code and find out what happened to your pet bill.

This is a labor of love but not easy. If you live in Inglewood, Westchester, Playa del Rey, El Segundo, El Porto, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, the Hollywood Riviera section of Torrance, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, Rolling Hills Estates, Portuguese Bend or Santa Catalina Island, then you write to me. If you live elsewhere, write to your own Member of the Assembly, and if you do not know who he is, write to State Senator Richard Richards, State Building, Los Angeles, who has a large staff which will not thank me for this.

WHEN I was a very small boy in Manchester, Iowa, which

is in the northeastern portion of Iowa, about 50 miles west of Dubuque, which is on the Mississippi River, fifty miles east of Waterloo, and fifty miles north of Cedar Rapids, the Congressman from our Congressional District always sent us free seeds.

My father said, "Plant the things in the back yard."

My mother said, "They will not grow."

I planted the seeds. Some grew and most of them did not grow. The United States Congress quit sending out free seeds many years ago but I still get letters from people who want free seeds, even though I am not a Congressman.

get a legal opinion from the Legislature Counsel, I always ask them if they want a "hurricane, galloping" opinion, which means a hurriedly written legal opinion, or a good one. If they are smart, they tell me to let the Legislative Counsel's office take its time, which usually means that within not more than 30 days I get a good legal opinion, which can stand up in the law courts. Meanwhile, it is my own private guess that in spite of what you may hear or read, the noises from jet aircraft will get much worse before they are reduced. If I were a real politician or a statesman (a dead politician), I would not be so frank with you, but I assume that you want the truth, unpleasant though it may be.

### American Savings & Loan to Back Women's Club Project

### Garden Checklist

By California Association of Nurserymen

1. Feed Tuberos Begonias again and spray for mildew if it shows up. These will give another month of color in some areas.
2. Plant Ranunculus and Anemones now. For a striking effect, intersperse them with tall Bearded Iris. The bloom usually overlaps.
3. Don't delay another week on winter annuals. The closer it gets to winter, the less chance you have of getting their color before spring.
4. Hold off on rose feeding from here out. If fall bloom is less than spectacular, you can vow to take better care of them next year.
5. Seed new lawns. Renovate old ones. In either case, cover the seed with peat and keep it moist at all times.
