TV in Classroom Tests Starting

Television sets, which will be used in four schools to test the value of educational TV, arrived last week and will be in use shortly, according to school officials in Torrance.

Sets will be used at Riviera and Casimir Elementary Schools and at Torrance and South High Schools. Various methods of showing the programs from Los Angeles will be tested. Assistant Superintendent, Albert Posner said.

South High, for instance, will have one set which will be used by only one class at a time in such fields as science, social studies, careers, and English.

Torrance High, on the other hand, will try using two sets at once in its auditorium, with TV programs shown to several classes at once.

Casimir, which has two, and Riviera, which has one set, will also try various methods. After study of whether children learn better with TV supplementing regular instruction and the best methods of presentation, officials hope to be able to answer many more questions. For the present, the educational TV in Torrance will have limited use as supplementary material and will not be viewed by one class every day.

Sermon For Today on 'Unreality'

"Unreality," the subject of the Lesson-Sermon to be read in all Christian Science churches today, is characterized by materiality and animality which oppose God's divine government.

Jesus never healed disease or destroyed evil by making a reality of it. He knew that God, good, is the only reality. Thus all that is unlike good, or God, can be overcome. The Golden Text is his statement as recorded by Matthew (7:17), "Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire."

Paul, an apostle of Jesus, is quoted from Romans (8:1, 2), "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death."

A correlative passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy declares, "God never punishes man for doing right, for honest labor, or for deeds of kindness, though they expose him to fatigue, cold, heat, contagion. If man seems to incur the penalty through matter, this is but a belief of mortal mind, not an enactment of God's law."


13-Year-Old Helps Chest Fund Drive

St. Lawrence Martyr Church Sets Two-Week Mission on Christianity

Two weeks of special devotion for Catholics, combined with instruction for interested non-Catholics, will be provided at St. Lawrence Martyr Church beginning today and ending on Sunday, Oct. 18. Monsignor Collins, pastor, announces that the Mission will be conducted by Fathers Thomas J. McCormack, CSP, and John Ritzius, CSP.

In explaining the purpose of the Mission, Father McCormack called it a time of special Grace in the spiritual life of the parish. Under the guidance of the Preacher each soul turns the searchlight of divine truth inward over heart and mind, and re-evaluates his life according to the pattern of the Maker. Fundamental truths, Father McCormack explained, are discussed and applied to daily life. These are the truths that men should live by in order to achieve their ultimate happiness — eternal life with God.
