



Lions Drag Strip to Fete Fifth Birthday Saturday

Its fifth anniversary will be celebrated Saturday afternoon and evening by Lions Associated Drag Strip. More than 300 vehicles will perform on the big black-top at 223rd St. near Alameda Ave. in what bids to be one of the finest drag meets of 1959.

Mickey Thompson, who not only manages LADS and does a daily stint for a Los Angeles newspaper, but last week set 16 national and international marks at Bonneville Flats — including the new American

land-speed record of 363.67 m.p.h. — said at least 25 of the west's hottest gas dragsters will main-event the show.

Qualifying runs will start at 4 p.m., with top eliminator heats going from 8 p.m. under the arc-lights. The regular, 90-cent admission charge will prevail.

John C. Simmons, business manager of Lions Associated (representing nine harbor area Lions Clubs sponsoring the famous strip), said that over three-quarters of a million persons have seen meets on LADS since its opening in 1955.

"LADS has one of the highest safety records in the nation," Simmons stated, "and we attribute much of it to the rigid rules governing all our competition."

Among the gas-dragster hotshots in action will be Jim Nelson's Dragmaster and the Ted Cyr-Bill Hopper team of Escondido, returning to LADS with Ol' Blue; sensational little TV actor-dragster, Tommy Ivo of Burbank; Jack Christman of Compton with Sidewinder I (tuned by Joe Mallard of Long Beach) and "Speed" Reed of Compton with Sidewinder II. Both sport blown Chryslers, as does Ol' Blue. Ivo's job is Buick-powered. Dragmaster packs a super-charged Chevy.

BOATERS INVITED TO SMALL CRAFT HEARING

Boaters from Long Beach to Malibu are invited to attend a hearing of the Small Crafts Harbor Commission on the Redondo Union High School auditorium, Diamond St. and Pacific Coast Hwy., Redondo Beach, Oct. 20, at 7 p.m.

Purpose of the hearing is to assist the Commission in determining what rules and regulations should be followed under the authority of the new boating law AB 828. This law was passed at the last session of the state legislature and regulates the registration of all boats. It also regulates the numbering, lighting and many other facets of the operation of boats in California waters. This is the fourth in a series of hearings held at various points throughout the state and is a continuation of the commission's regular meeting of the 19th in Los Angeles.

Parnelli Jones, the Torrance Flash, who has just completed a successful season of sprint car racing in the mid-west and south, will be back in action at Ascot Stadium, 182nd St. and Vermont Ave. Saturday night when he competes in the Sprint Car Grand Prix.

Parnelli will be battling with two score other top rated drivers in the race for the money Saturday, and 24 of them will put the best cars in the West in the main event of 100 laps.

THE TORRANCE Flash began his racing career in the jalopies, and graduated into the California Racing Assn. sprint cars.

He was leading in championship points on the Coast when he left to tour the midwest tracks.

Saturday night's feature will be the longest race and the biggest starting field of sprint cars ever signed for the Ascot track.
