**Harvest Casserole:**  
(Apple, Porky, Sweet Potato Bake)  
1½ pounds pork sausage links  
3 large apples  
3 large cooked sweet potatoes  
¼ cup sausage drippings  
¼ cup boiling water  
½ cup brown sugar  
Brown sausage links and core, but don't pare apples. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise and place in a greased 2½ or 3-quart casserole. Slice apples into ¼-inch rings; place with links on top of potatoes. Combine sugar, drippings, and water and pour over ingredients. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350°) one hour. Spoon sauce over each serving. Makes 6 servings.
