Torrance Junior Woman's Club held its follow-up Polio Clinic Tuesday evening, Nov. 3, from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Benstead Plunge in Torrance. The total number of inoculations given at this clinic was 1,070, allowing the club to present \$373.12 to the National Polio Foundation. The total amount donated to the Foundation from the club for the two clinics was \$1,030.12 and this donation is to be used by the Foundation for their work in our own area.

The Juniors were assisted by fourteen student vocational nurses from the Harbor College. This group was sponsored by their instructor, Miss Ruth Morrison, and were of extremely valuable assistance to the doctors and nurses by keeping the syringes filled with vaccine, thus improving

the efficiency of the clinic. Miss Morrison and her group of students have assisted at twelve Polio Clinics in the past three months and are available through Harbor College according to Mrs. Alex Martinis, president of the vocational nursing sorority.
