Mrs. Russell Bardick, 22816 Avis Ave., is today's guest in the Favorite Recipe column. Mrs. Bardick, whose husband is an illustrator, represents him in the various communities in Los Angeles County. Besides participating in the business world, today's guest is active in PTA, civic organizations, and conducts a well organized home.

She is the mother of two sons, David 12 and Billy 6, both students at Meadow Park school.

She was born in Hilo, Hawaii and came to Salt Lake City, Utah when very young. She has lived in California since the seventh grade, and with her family came to Torrance five years ago. She attended Brigham Young University.

The local woman is parliamentarian of the Meadow Park PTA. She has worked with this unit for four years and served on the council for two years. She has also served as a den mother for the scouts.

Prior to her marriage, Mrs. Bardick worked as Control Operator for the Civil Aeronautics Administration and also held a position with Paramount Pictures.

Her choice recipes, which she is sharing today, consist of Baked Pork Chops, Mushrooms and Rice, and an Angel Pie.

BAKED PORK CHOPS

6 center cut chops Flour
2 lg. peeled tomatoes Salt
1 jar olives (small Pepper
stuffed) Sherry wine

Trim off fat on chops, brown on both sides. Place layer of chops in casserole, then sliced tomatoes and sliced olives. Sprinkle lightly with flour, salt and pepper. Add another layer of chops, etc. Pour 1/4 to 1/2 cup sherry wine over all. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour or until chops are tender. Serves four.

MUSHROOMS AND RICE

2 tbsp. butter 1 c. brown rice
1 c. mushrooms 1 can onion soup
(sliced 2 oz.)

Melt butter in skillet. Add drained mushrooms (save juice) and brown. Add rice and stir for 1 minute to warm rice. Add soup. Add can of water and mushroom juice. Place in casserole, cover and bake 45 minutes to 1 hour at 350 degrees. Serves four to six.

ANGEL PIE

4 egg whites 4 egg yolks
3/4 cup sugar 1/2 c. sugar
3/4 tsp. cream of tartar 6 tsp. lemon juice

Beat egg whites until stiff. Add sugar and cream of tartar. Place in greased pie pan and bake 45 minutes at 300 degrees. Combine egg yolks, sugar and lemon juice. Cook until thick in double boiler, stirring constantly.

Cool filling before spreading over baked mixture. Top with 1 cup whipped cream, 1/4 cup powdered sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Chill for 4 to 6 hours before serving. Very rich, serves six.
