North Torrance Fuchsia Society.







Edwin Fox Creating New Market Empire -- After His 'Retirement'

The story of how a kind man with a tremendous amount of energy twice built a grocery market empire is quite a fascinating one. His knowledge and "know how" stem from his experience in 1932 with a partner in the Los Angeles Central Market. Edwin J. Fox, and his partner, Charles Cramer, both ambitious young college men during the depression days, worked tirelessly to prove to the Grand Central people that their idea of leasing concessions where empty stalls existed was feasible. The idea worked out exceedingly well and from this background came the knowledge and basic training that made Fox one of the most important men in the food industry, and the Fox Market chain one of the fastest growing market organizations in Southern California.

Edwin Fox and his partner, Cramer, with the impetus and enthusiasm provided by a taste of success and youth soon had managed to sign 16 leases, involving produce, delicatessen, meat and poultry items. They also acquired experience and knowledge that was invaluable in this particular phase of the grocery business and to their future.

A MAN WITH foresight, Fox soon realized that something new was coming into being in the grocery business. It was the super-market era, and to Fox it soon became his ambition and goal to operate one. He loved the idea of a beautiful up to date super-market and decided to gamble their 16 leases as the beginning to his objective.

Through clever financial maneuvering, by 1945, Fox and his partner had their first supermarket. They also had all the headaches, responsibilities and problems too that go with a big project like the operation of a supermarket. However, nothing deterred them and in time, by 1953, after much hard work and ingenuity, long hours and brilliant strategy, Fox and his partner were managing and had interests in 35 markets known as the Mayfair chain. Fox, mission accomplished then sat back and took inventory. He decided he would like to be able to enjoy the fruits of his labor and retire. He and his partner then sold out their interests on Arden Farms.

BUT TIME HUNG heavy for the retired Fox, he became restless and so in 1954, one year later he bought two markets back from Mayfair just to be occupied. He named them, "Fox" because "Fox" was a short name and would save money in neon lighting space and also it would be good to name them after someone involved with the company. His idea to keep himself occupied with two stores, however, backfired. In no time at all he was knee deep again in negotiations and back in the swing of business... the Fox chain was really on its way.

Everything happened so fast, Fox realized he needed competent assistance and a sound organization, strong on management and promotion know how. He contacted two men he had worked with successfully and who knew him well. Soon he made the announcement to the trade that Robert E. Palmer

DFG Reports Silver Salmon Outlook Moot

The Department of Fish and Game revealed today that the outlook for the silver salmon fishery on California's north coast this year is both good and bad.

On the good side is an unexpectedly large return to north coastal streams of two year old griseal, planted last spring. About 2,000 of these premature males have already been caught this year in the Mad River north of Eureka.

On the bad side is the fact that in all probability there will be far fewer silvers to be planted next March. Egg-eating at the Pudding Creek collecting station was not up to par last year because of the dry winter and fish raised from Washington eggs were affected by a parasite that has infested Crystal Lake Hatchery, where the salmon are reared. In previous years the parasite attacked only trout and left the silvers alone.
