

Speedy News Promised for Winter Games

SAN FRANCISCO — Results and news of the Olympic Winter Games at Squaw Valley, California, February 18-28, will be made available to the world's press, radio and television outlets quicker than a skier will be able to race the men's downhill course.

This was promised by Robert DiGiorgio, executive vice-president of the Winter Olympics Organizing Committee, in announcing Addressograph-Multi-graph Corporation's addition to the unique data processing system that will prepare results of the international spectacle.

DiGiorgio emphasized the built-in accuracy of the equipment. "The machine eliminates manual transcription of unfamiliar and sometimes difficult names along with complex scoring data," DiGiorgio said. "And it insures that every copy will be identical and correct, since it will reproduce exactly the information from the computer."

William H. Wilson, Addressograph-Multi-graph Vice President who joined DiGiorgio in making the announcement, graphically illustrated how scores and standings would be made available for international release two minutes after the end of the event. In the past some results, particularly those in jumping and figure skating competitions, have taken hours to determine.

Wilson explained how the latest developments in electronic data processing and

State Angling License on Sale by DFG

California's 1960 sportfishing licenses are now on sale at all the Department of Fish and Game's 1,300 license agents in Southern California.

A license is required for all anglers 16 years of age or older.

TO PURCHASE a resident angling license a person must have resided continuously in California for six months immediately prior to the date the license is purchased. An exception is that any member of the Armed Forces on active duty qualifies as a resident Californian as far as angling license purposes are concerned.

As prescribed by the State Legislature, a basic resident 1960 sport fishing license, valid only for fishing in ocean waters and for taking frogs, will cost \$3.

BY PURCHASING a \$1 license stamp and affixing it to the \$3 license the angler may take all species of fish except trout, but including steelhead.

By purchasing two of the \$1 stamps and affixing them to the basic \$3 license, at a total cost of \$5, the angler may take all species of fish, including trout.

Nearly 300 boys who participated in touch football leagues sponsored by the Torrancia Recreation Dept. were honored at an awards banquet Saturday.


Principal speaker at the banquet was Bob Shoup, varsity football coach at North High School. Films were shown of the USC-UCLA football game.
