

Steve Schmidt; the council and recreation terms of the Miami McVey and Bernard Morgan; the library commission terms of Mrs. John G. L. and Mrs. P. E. Humphreys; and the civil defense and disaster committee term of Robert Ellis.

Monday, January 4, 1960, at the Konya Room of the Palms to discuss Commission appointments. **Hope Church to Open New Educational Unit Sunday**

Christmas present for the approximately 200 children of Evangelical United Brethren Church of North Torrance was a new \$50,000 educational unit, containing 6400 square feet. The new building will be occupied next Sunday.

Included in the new facilities are two floors with children's rest rooms as well as washrooms on each floor. Acoustical insulation has been used throughout, with daytime lighting and curtintioned classrooms for the upper grades.

The basement contains a stage and will be available as a recreation room.

The building will accommodate 20 teachers and their classes divided into five departments.

Those taking office with the opening of the new unit Sunday include Ed Collins, Sunday School superintendent; Mrs. Peggy Holly, pre-schoolers; Woodrow Welte, beginners (Grades 1-3); Jack Cooper, primary (grades 4-6); and Gerald McQueen, juniors (grades 7-9).

Teachers will use graded literature published by Gospel Light Publications throughout the classes.

Children and parents of the area are being invited by Rev. Monrad Bergesen, pastor of Hope Church, to attend services there.
