Silva Family Featured Again In Current Look

Torrance once again is featured nationally in an article in Look Magazine. A full-page story in the Jan. 5 issue tells how the problems of Robert Silva of Torrance were cleared by the action of Look Magazine.

The story is titled "Wonderful things happen when you're in Look," and carries a photo of Robert Silva of 21513 Evalyn. Following is the story: American-born Bob Silva, ex-paratrooper, living with his wife and two children had faced the prospect of losing his citizenship and being deported for four years. While living with his parents in Mexico as a teenager, he had served briefly in the Mexican Army Reserve, unknowingly jeopardizing his American citizenship, Look reported. After serving three years in the U.S. Army, he was notified by the Immigration to deport him. Reaction to his story in Look was immediate.

First there were the phone calls to Silva from family, friends, even the Mayor of Torrance, who offered to call a meeting of the City Council to request Congressional action. Then came notification from immigration officials that Silva's case was being reviewed. Two days later he was informed that his citizenship was secure, the magazine reported.

Officers for Manuscripters For Year Told

Manville Chapman of Hermosa Beach will head Southwest Manuscripters during 1960, it was announced at the writers' final meeting of the year. He has served the club during 1959 as treasurer. Chapman is a professional artist, formerly of Taos, N.M., and for the past 17 years he has been employed as an artist and writer in the aircraft industry. A former newspaperman, he is working towards the goal of novelist, illustrating his own work.

Field of Torrance, treasurer, and Betty Rooker and Bernie Miller, both of Redondo Beach, hospitality co-chairmen.

On Scholl's retiring board are Betty Rink, playwright of Torrance, vice president and program chairman; Frances Grace, Manhattan Beach, press chairman, and Lula Messall, Redondo Beach, hospitality chairman.

School Builders Continue Race With Stork in 1959

Torrance school builders and the stork continued their race during 1959, with five new schools opened during the year and many more planned for opening in 1960. The new year, 1960, promises also to be a year of more building activity, with three new schools scheduled to open and additions to 12 other schools. Work is slated to start on additions to six other schools and at least one new elementary plant. Rehabilitation of Fern Ave. School also will be completed during 1960.

During 1959, Torrance gained 2000 students and five new schools — Magruder, Yukon, Hamilton, Lincoln, and Columbia. Additions to South High School also were completed. In 1960, another 2000 enrollment increase is predicted. This year, three schools — Madison, Towers, to relieve Flavian and Carr; Steele; and Adams, to relieve Wood School — are slated for opening. Work also is expected to get underway on Victor Elementary School, which will relieve Meadow Park Elementary School. Scheduled for 1960 openings are additions to North and South High Schools and to Ardrona, Edison, Steele, WALTERIA, Anza, Arlington, Newton, Sepulveda, Lincoln, and Torrance Elementary Schools. Work also will begin on additions to Carr Flavian, Meadow Park, Crenshaw, and Magruder schools. School construction work has moved ahead quickly since passage of a \$15,000,000 bond issue by local voters in October, 1958.


