

Weister, Reinert Lead City Stats

Torrance High's "double trouble" basketball scoring combo, forward Bob Weister and senior Bill Reinert, are tops among the city's prep cagers in the point department, according to statistics compiled and released today.

South's Joe Austin is right behind, and North's Ron Combs is fourth.

Weister had 207 points in 13 non-league games, for a 15.9 average. Reinert had 205 points and a 15.7 average, and Austin has scored 105 points in South's seven games for an even 15.0 mark, including one Pioneer League tilt.

Combs, North's only senior, sports a 10.3 average for 12 non-league games.

Hunter Safety Course Begins At Redondo Hi

The opening of the first in a series of classes in Hunter Safety was announced today by the California State Department of Fish and Game.

The class will open Wednesday evening, Jan. 27, at Redondo Union High School. The first session will last eight weeks, one evening each week, from 7 to 9:15 p.m. This course deals with the safe handling of firearms and ammunition.

All junior hunters under 16 must take and pass this course before they may obtain a hunting license.

IN 1954, the California State Legislature enacted Section 424 of the California Fish and Game Code. Section 424 states that "No hunting license shall be issued to any person under the age of 16 years unless he presents to the person authorized to issue such license either (a) evidence that he has held a hunting license issued by the state in a prior year or (b) a certificate of competency as provided in this section."

Previous to the enactment of this law in 1954, 12,496 untrained juveniles were licensed to hunt in this state (in 1954). 43 casualties were reported from this group or one casualty for every 290 persons.

Beaver July 1st of 1954 and the end of the year, 17,027 juveniles were trained and licensed. From this group, only 3 casualties occurred, these three casualties being inflicted on those persons, not by them.

SUMMING UP the reports of several years, the trained juvenile hunter is about 19 times safer than the untrained hunter. In other words, the Hunter Safety courses are a great success. These juveniles who skip the class even though the law only states 16 years of age, are among the highest percentage of casualties each year.

The lowest percentage (next to nothing) is that of the trained students.

The Fish and Game department is requesting the help of every sportsman, club leader or official in the tremendous task of enrolling juveniles and training them.

Homer Barrage Drops at Coliseum in '59 Season

Remember the hue and cry which greeted the announcement of a 251-foot left field foul line? Remember the derision which was directed at the so-called Chinese Wall or Shoji Screen? Remember the predictions that Babe Ruth's home run record would be in jeopardy? Remember the suggestion to Commissioner Ford C. Frick, made by some sports writers, that any homer marks established at the Coliseum should not be counted?

So, after two seasons in the Coliseum and with one more coming up, let's look at what has happened in the home run department at the Figueroa field.

NOT ONLY has the Ruthian record been un-challenged, but no single Dodger club record has been broken.

Gil Hodges and Duke Snider still hold the record of twenty-five home-park homers, hit in 1954 and 1956 at Ebbetts Field. Charlie Neal topped the Dodgers at the Coliseum in 1958 with fourteen and Wally Moon matched that in '59.

The all-time Dodger home run high for a full season is 43, hit by Snider in 1956. Hodges hit 25 last season and no Dodger has come closer since the move to the West Coast.

AS A MATTER of cold, statistical fact there was a sharp revision downward on all home run hitting at the Coliseum in 1959. Whether the pitchers shook off their shellshock of 1958 or whether it just was a better Dodger year, there was a sharp decline.

Looks like the Dodger pitchers made good on their Spring-time pledge:

"Let's just pitch and forget all about that left field screen."

THERE WERE ninety-one home runs hit over the left field screen by visiting sluggers in 1958 and this dropped to 72 during the championship '59 campaign. The right field bombardment dropped from 101 to 90.
