Rummage Sale



| 1 c shortening | 2 3/4 c sifted flour |
| 1 1/2 c sugar | 1 tsp cream of tartar |
| 2 eggs | 1 tsp soda |
| 2 tsp sugar | 1/2 tsp salt |
| 2 tsp cinnamon | |

Mix shortening, sugar and eggs. Sift together flour, cream of tartar, soda, salt. Stir into shortening mixture. Chill dough and roll into balls the size of a walnut. Roll through the mixture the sugar and cinnamon. Bake 12 to 15 minutes on an ungreased cookie sheet at 350 degrees.
