Forty-one Fouls in EC Game

Hips and elbows were freely thrown and 41 whistles blown Friday as El Camino's surprising tough Warriors dropped a 73-66 decision to title contending Bakersfield in a Metro Conference basketball game at ECC.

Although playing without the ineligible Jack Runyan, the scrappy Warriors found themselves in a 64-64 tie with less than two minutes remaining in a wild near free-for-all contest.

However, the El Caminos had three players exit via the five personal foul route in the late minutes and couldn't put the clincher points through the rim.

Bakersfield substitute guard Mark Hasen netted Bakersfield's key go-ahead points on a couple of free throws and a jump shot and that was that. Hasen had 31 for the evening.

Warriors' John Boyd, Harry Dinnel, and Joe Cattavera fouled out.

Dinnel had 20 points, and was a standout on defense in the near-upset.

The loss gave ECC a 2-6 conference record.

The Warriors played host to lowly Santa Monica last night, and play unbeaten Long Beach Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Long Beach.


Central Babe Ruth League Calls General Meeting for Tuesday
