Summer school classes in Torrance are considered as ex-

ensions of the regular school program, with instruction designed for bright, average, and slow students. Last year, average daily attendance was more than 6300.

Classes will be offered on a high school level in subjects for which enrollment is sufficient. Eighth grade graduates will be able to take refresher mathematics, reading, algebra I, practical typing, English skills, general science, instrumental music, vocal music, practical speech, exploratory foreign language, and art.

Elementary sessions will be held at all schools, if enrollment is sufficient.
