Mr. and Mrs. Don Larson and son, 1104 Elm, have returned from a week's vacation in Utah where they visited their parents.


Major Philanthropy

Juniors Complete YM Decorating

Due to the 100% participation of the membership of the Torrance Junior Woman's Club, Marina District, CFWC, the goal of redecorating the Torrance YMCA has been achieved, with the additional purchase of several large pieces of play equipment and furnishings and a number of smaller pieces. This project was chosen by the club members as their major philanthropy, and was accomplished entirely by the Juniors with no outside assistance.

Because of the impermanence of the present YMCA building, an attempt was made by Mrs. Allen E. Hofferber, philanthropy director, to plan the redecoration with a minimum of expenditures and a great deal of work done by Juniors and their husbands. The redecoration included painting of the complete interior with minor repairs as necessary, and the sewing of some gay striped curtains to give the building a more pleasing appearance.

The remainder of the allotted \$1,000 was used to purchase the following articles: a trampoline, a large tumbling mat, 5 feet by 60 feet, fifty-two chairs, and the small equipment consisting of ping pong sets, two battle bird sets and shuffleboard sticks and pucks. This equipment was selected to be permanent assets of the YMCA not only in their present building, but wherever they may be in the future.
