

NORTHROP GROW FROM TINY PLANT TO FAR-FLUNG FIRM IN 20 YEARS

Northrop Corp. is a famous name in U.S. military aircraft. Since its establishment in 1939, Northrop has grown in a tiny nucleus of 50 people headquartered in a Hawthorne, Calif., hotel to a far-flung manufacturing and research enterprise that includes four divisions and a wholly-owned subsidiary, Page Communications Engineers, Inc.

THE COMPANY'S Radio-Plane Division, headquartered in Van Nuys, is the principal U.S. manufacturer of target and surveillance drone systems. Radioplane has developed drones from a full spectrum of speed, altitude and flight duration capabilities, using turbojet, rocket and reciprocating engines.

flight training program, and the N-156F Freedom Fighter. And as the space age unfolds, Northrop is gearing its capabilities to production and research for advanced weapons and space systems designed to aid in the defense of the United States.

DEVELOPMENT of its present aerospace capabilities has been accomplished, according to Thomas V. Jones, president, by stressing in the past decade, low-cost solutions to defense problems, multiple application and diversification of products.

THE COMPANY'S fourth and newest division, Northrop International, represents Northrop throughout the free world. Headquartered with the corporate offices in Beverly Hills, Northrop International is currently active on six continents. Headed by J. Gilbert Nettleson, Jr., the division serves a long-standing Northrop tradition of supporting Free World defense through the tailoring of advanced U.S. technology into weapons designed to meet the specific needs of friendly nations outside the U.S.

IN GEORGIA... Army Pvt. Carl T. Sutow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Y. Sutow, 1528 W. 256th St., Harbor City, recently completed the radio-teletype operation course at the Southeastern Signal School, Fort Gordon, Ga. He entered the Army last July and completed basic training at Fort Ord.

A quick rundown of the activities of the company's four divisions and its subsidiary illustrates the space age capabilities of the firm. The Norair Division, located at the company's original site in Hawthorne, is the company's largest division. Its products include the USAF T-38 Talon supersonic jet trainer; the N-156F Freedom Fighter, a lightweight, multi-use fighter developed for use by NATO, SEATO and other allied nations; and the SM-62 Shark intercontinental guided missile, the Air Force's first operational missile of intercontinental range.

THE N-156F, embodying a new concept in lightweight, high-performance and low-cost fighters with Century Series fighter capabilities, is the only fighter aircraft system being financed by the U.S. government for the specific use by America's allies.

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NORAIR, headed by R. R. Nolan, vice president and general manager, is also engaged in subcontract work on major airframe sections of USAF-Boeing KC-135 jet tankers, Boeing 707 and 720 jet airliners, and USAF-McDonnell F-101 jet fighters.

Communications systems designed, developed and installed by Page link the North American continent and England, span Europe in support of NATO, interconnect areas in the Far East and the Pacific, and bounce messages from the polar regions.

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A SIGNIFICANT operations and marketing plan, "Operation Forward" was recently initiated by Norair. The plan provides a detailed blueprint for Norair's future scientific and manufacturing strides.

SIGNALS FROM the Paris headquarters of SHAPE reach Naples and Izmir via a multi-channel very high frequency system designed and installed by Page. As with all Northrop divisions, Page possesses tremendous growth potential.

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The Nortronics Division, which recently announced plans for a new research and development campus in Palos Verdes, is a developer and producer of electronics, electro-mechanical and optical products.

THE N-3PB aided in sinking the German battleship Bismarck and one of these planes captured a Nazi submarine, single handed. During the war, Northrop's greatest contribution was the P-61 Black Widow, first plane ever built exclusively for night fighting.

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The new research campus will be the center of a wide range of scientific research. Nortronics scientists, utilizing the creative environment and advanced equipment of the center, will engage in research in such fields as astronomical and inertial guidance systems, navigation and guidance computers, infrared and optical systems and equipment, with special emphasis on space technology.

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THE FIRST UNIT of the campus, scheduled for occupancy late this year, will initially house a research staff of more than 600 scientists and engineers. The initial segment of the facility will cost in excess of \$4 million. Site of the new center is the Research Park area of the Palos Verdes Peninsula, overlooking the Pacific Ocean.

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The Nortronics Division, headed by Dr. William F. Ballhaus, is subcontractor for the guidance subsystem for the Air Force's GAM-87A air-launched ballistic missile and is manufacturer of a great variety of components, including the launcher, for the Hawk surface-to-air missile.

It ended night bombing by the enemy on both European and Pacific fronts, destroyed enemy planes, buzz-bombs, airfields and depots. It was armed with four 50-caliber machine guns. Four 20mm cannons were hidden in its belly. WITH the emergence of the jet age, Northrop designed and developed the F-89 Scorpion, an all-weather interceptor. The twin-jet Scorpion is still very much a part of the Air Force's all-weather interceptor mission, and has compiled an enviable service record.

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Nortronics, with facilities in Anaheim and Hawthorne, also produces DATICO, an automatic checkout system for missile systems, now on order by all three services and in operation on the Navy's Polaris missile; the Mark I inertial guidance system and test equipment for the Snark; the Q-ball, an attitude-sensing, direction-finding device for space vehicles; and an array of other space age hardware.

Northern technological know-how in aircraft production is today reflected in the T-38 Talon supersonic trainer, scheduled to replace the T-33 in the Air Force's supersonic
