Yummy Hungarian Recipes Shared by Mrs. J. Lucas

Hungarian recipes given to her by her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Horvath of Ohio, a native of Hungary, are contributed by Mrs. Joseph T. Lucas, 1755 Juniper for the Favorite Recipe column today.

The Lucases, Mr. and Mrs., and two children, Tommy and Karen have lived in Torrance for the past 15 years. Mr. Lucas is a Torrance Post Office employee.

Tommy, 20, is now a PFC with the United States Marine Corps stationed in Okinawa.

Karen Sue is 15 and is a sophomore at Bishop Montgomery High school.

The family attends Nativity Catholic Church. Mrs. Lucas is a member of the Court St.

of America, and Mr. Lucas is a member of the Knights of Co-Catherine, Catholic Daughters Iumbus.

The first two recipes given by the guest cook are those used by her mother and her family for several generations in Hungary. The last recipe, Beef Roast, is an idea originated by Mrs. Lucas, who is acclaimed by neighbors and friends as a "very good cook."

Kipples (Nut Cookies)

- 6 c flour
- 1 Lb. butter
- 6 egg yolks
- (beaten)
- 1 c milk
- 1 c milk
- (boil and cool)
- 1 cake yeast
- (dissolve in 1/4 c milk)

Add butter to hot milk, cool and add beaten egg yolks, add yeast mixture. Add flour gradually. Make into small balls, place on cookie sheet, refrigerate over night. Roll out individual balls on board dusted with powdered sugar to approximately 1/4 inch in thickness. Spread with filling, roll like jelly roll. Be sure ends are sealed. Roll again in granulated sugar. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for approximately 1 hour or until light brown. Makes about 80 to 90 cookies.

Kalach (Nut Roll)

- 6 c flour
- 2 eggs (beaten)
- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 1 c milk
- (boiled and cooled)
- 1/2 lb. butter
- 2 cakes yeast
- (dissolved in warm milk and little sugar)
- 2 tsp. salt

Add butter, sugar, salt to hot milk, cool, add beaten eggs and yeast mixture. Gradually add flour. Mix and let rise like bread. Knead dough twice, roll out like jelly roll. Spread filling on dough, place on cookie sheets. Cover and let rise about one hour. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Brush with butter when done.

FILLING

Mix 4 cups ground English walnuts and 4 cups sugar. Add 1 tsp. butter about 1/2 cup milk. Cook and stir until sugar melts. Remove from fire and add 1 tsp. lemon juice. Cool and spread on dough.

Beef Pot Roast

Brown a 2 1/2 or 3 lb. beef. Add 1 chopped onion. After meat is brown add one small bottle of Jan-u-wine Soy Sauce. Cover and cook over very low heat for approximately two hours or until tender. Makes delicious gravy.
