## Bryant's Tops Peary for City Basketball Title

Jumping Jim Portis sank 18 points and Avery Bryant's Recreation Basketball team outran Peary Jr. High Tuesday for a 53-42

champs, ran up a 25-14 first half advantage after an 18-point second quarter, then matched the Faculty League representatives point for point to cop the city title.

Bryant's is also scheduled to play the nationally famed Harlem Clowns, April 1, at Redondo High.

# El Camino '9' Eyes Conference Title

Coach Chuck Freeman's El Camino College baseball club is ripe, roaring, and ready-to-go as the 1960 Metropolitan Conference seasons sets to open tomorrow afternoon.

The Warriors launch their championship bid at home against Valley JC at 3 p.m. after racking up an impressive 9-4 non-conference record, including the Metro Tourney Championship last Saturday and a 9-7 win over the USC Frosh Tuesday.

Freeman has nominated righthander Dennis Shaves to go against Valley, which was the Warriors' final victim at the Metro tourney, 4-1.

"WE'VE GOT five boys capable of starting now," Freeman said of his pitching staff, "so we'll throw a new man against each team."

tory over the USC Frosh. El Camino was outslugged 14-13, but firstbaseman Stan Beard, who went 4-for-4, won it with a 5th inning 355 foot home run over the right field screen, with two runners aboard.

SC's Nat Harty, a former Serra High prepster, had homered in the top of the inning over the left field barrier to tie the score at 5-5.

El Camino outfielder-catcher Danny Heun had two singles and a double, and two RBIs. Beard had four RBIs and scored four runs himself.

ALTHOUGH El Camino is "the team to beat," after being involved in a three team tie for the title last year, Coach Freeman foresees a rugged five team race.

"San Diego, Valley, Santa Monica, and Long Beach are all strong. The entire conference is probably stronger than it has been in many years," he said.

"There isn't a pigeon in the

conference this season," he added.

Freeman is in his third year at El Camino. Chuck is a 1948 graduate of USC, where he was a member of Troy's NCAA championship club. Bill Sharman and Jim Briedeweiser were also members of that potent aggregation.

ELSEWHERE around the conference Friday Long Beach City College will inaugurate collegiate night baseball at Recreation Park's Blair Field against San Diego JC in the first game of a double-header at 6 p.m.

Long Beach State and USC tangle in the "nightcap." Santa Monica plays at Harbor, and East L.A. is at Bakersfield.

## Andrews Runs For Long Beach At ELAJC Relays

Long Beach City College—armed with ex-prep sensation Dee Andrews—is favored to win the Eleventh Annual East Los Angeles Relays tomorrow afternoon at ELAJC.

The field events get under way at 1 p.m. and the running events are scheduled to start at 1:30.

Long Beach, second to Bakersfield by just four points at last year's Relays, will rely on Andrews — one of the top hurdle and broad jump men in the state and former All-CIF Football Player of the Year from Long Beach Poly — to lead LBCC to the perpetual trophy.

Metropolitan Conference track and field fans can look forward to several outstanding performances. El Camino's Darion Calhoun — who holds the college 120 yard high hurdle record (14.8) will challenge Andrews, and ECC's Miler Roger Lawson, who ran 4:29.6 last week, should give the Warriors an edge in the distance relay. Other top athletes entered from around the conference in-

clude Harbor's Sam Hicks, East L.A.'s Don Shaw and Long Beach's John Petty in the sprints; East L.A.'s Odell Preston, and Long Beach's Jack Talsky in the 440.

El Camino's Bud Cox in the high jump and Jack Dempsey in the pole vault are also among the conference's best.

## Battle of Lefties Set For North Hi

North High's crafty Dennis Hogue set South's power-packed righthanded batter order on its ear Tuesday and added insult to injury by slamming a towering home run in a 7-1 intra-city baseball victory at South.

If Saxon lefthander Billy Kehoe can match Hogue's four-hit stint today against Torrance, North will lay undisputed claim to the first "city baseball championship." The cross-town rivals collide at 3 p.m. at North.

Senior southpaw Tommy Richardson will pitch for the Tartars, who dropped an earlier 2-1 decision to North in a tournament game. Torrance was defeated by Redondo Tuesday, 4-2.

AGAINST SOUTH, Hogue (3-1) had little difficulty after the first inning, when the Spartans loaded the bases with nobody out but failed to score. The junior righthander — mixing up his fast ball, knuckler, and an overhand curve — struck out seven, walked only three, and in one stretch set down 14 men in a row without giving up a hit.

His booming home run off losing pitcher Larry Pace (1-2) sailed over the leftfielder's head to lead off the third inning for what proved to be the winning run. There were 10 errors committed during the windy, chilling contest, seven by South.

NORTH, which entered the game without one bonafide .300 hitter, had seven safeties off four Spartan hurlers.

North dented the plate in the second inning after two were out. Thirdbaseman Bob Wallace — who had two hits for the afternoon — singled, took second on a wild pitch, and scored on Frank VanPatton's line single to center.

After Hogue homered in the third, the Saxons came back to score twice in the 5th, and three times in the 7th.

A WALK to Hogue, a hunt single, an error and Dwayne Merrill's perfectly executed squeeze bunt brought one run across, then Jack Golphenee stole home with two outs on a daring play.

Three walks, two errors, and Dave Marsden's single combined to bring home the three 7th inning tallies.

SOUTH PITCHERS gave up seven bases on balls. The Spartans scored an unearned run in the 6th after a walk, a throwing error, and Larry Anderson's single to center. On the play, Cliff Roy also attempted to score, but was cut down on a strike from

VanPatton to Marsden for the third out.

The game was the first scheduled intra-city baseball pair-up in Torrance's history. Coaches Bob Shoup (North) and Jerry McIlvaine (South) are former college teammates.

THEY PLAYED in 1954-55 at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

This afternoon Torrance has a chance to win back a "piece" of the mythical city championship after dropping two in a row. Torrance has a 4-4 record, South is 4-2, and North is 6-3. The league seasons begin next week.
