Los Cancioneros to Present Tenth Anniversary Concert March 26

Los Cancioneros, a choral organization born and "brought up" in Torrance, will present its Tenth Anniversary Concert on March 26, at Pier Avenue School in Hermosa Beach.

The mixed chorus had its beginnings in 1949 when eleven Hollywood Riviera neighbors met to sing together for fun. The meetings began through the efforts of two Riviera couples, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Mabin and Mr. and Mrs. William Beckman. Mrs. Mabin was chosen to direct the group and Pechman became its first president.

LOS CACIONEROS is now a chorus of forty-seven voices—people who like to sing together and who are willing to give the time and effort it takes to sing good music well.

The group is self-governed and self-supporting and its members come from the South Bay and surrounding areas. They represent many occupations and professions. El Retiro Park Clubhouse has been the rehearsal hall of the group ever since its early days, through the courtesy of the Torrance Recreation Department.



Only the Driver Can Cut State's Accident Figure

More than half of all traffic accidents that caused injury or death in California last year occurred on straight, level and dry roadways, during daylight hours and clear weather conditions.

These facts were disclosed by Bradford M. Crittenden, Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol, who said they were based on an analysis of 95,880 reportable, or fatal and injury accidents. Of these, 3082 were fatal accidents in which 8588 persons were killed, and 92,818 were injury

accidents in which 143,631 persons were hurt.

"While it is true that most reportable accidents occurred in the daytime, this is not true in regard to fatal accidents only," Crittenden noted. "Most fatal accidents occurred after dark and most of these were on roadways without street lights."

Observing that the conditions under which most accidents occur are the usual rather than the unusual, Crittenden added:

"The significant thing is that

people rather than conditions cause traffic accidents. If each of the motorists who were involved in these accidents had been a little more alert, a little more considerate of the other fellow, a little more careful about observing the traffic laws, the toll of death and injury would have been reduced dramatically.

"Call it defensive driving, or self enforcement, or whatever term you want, the fact remains that the problems of traffic accidents are solved only by the people who drive our motor vehicles."

Yves Costeau's underwater classic "The Silent World" will be screened at 7 and 8:30 p.m. on March 25. Admission is free.




