A legal inquiry into the present ordinance was ordered, and it was indicated that the entire drainage fund law may be scrapped.

Voters May Register at CC Office

Voters may register, or re-register, at the Torrance Chamber of Commerce office, 1611 Cravens Ave., it was announced today by President R. S. Pyle.

Pyle said the Chamber's office manager, Mrs. Shirley Robinson, is now a deputy registrar of voters. This service is offered to the public.

Pyle added, due to the great many requests of area citizens. Mrs. Robinson said a person must have the following qualifications to register for voting:

1. Be 21 years of age.
2. Be a resident of California one year and Los Angeles county 90 days.
3. Be able to read the English language and write own name.
4. Register from your residence address and NOT your business address.
5. If foreign born — have been a citizen for at least 90 days and show naturalization papers.

You must re-register, Mrs. Robinson added, if:

1. You have changed your address.
2. You failed to vote at the last general election in 1958.
3. You have changed your name.
4. You are changing your political affiliation.
