

Harbor Area YW To Open Year Sept. 14

Dr. Frances Clark, new president of the Board of Directors of the Harbor Area YWCA will preside over the first board meeting of the new program year on Wednesday, Sept. 14, at the Headquarters building, 437 West Ninth St., San Pedro.

As a "YW" volunteer, she has served on the San Pedro Branch Administrative committee, been chairman of the Public Affairs committee for San Pedro, served on the area board as Area membership chairman, headed up two membership drives, chairman of the structure study committee and been 1st vice-president of the Area Board.

Volunteering in the Young Women's Christian Association was not her first contact, however, as she lived in the local YW Residence from July 1921 until September 1922.

A native of Nebraska, Dr. Clark completed high school in San Jose and went on to receive her A.B. degree from Stanford University. Later she received a PHD from the Uni-

versity of Michigan. She was employed by the California Department of Fish and Game in Marine Research at Terminal Island where she was in charge of the laboratory from 1941 until she retired in 1953 except from January until June in 1954 when on leave to set up a marine fisheries research program for the Peruvian Government.

A busy year is foreseen by Dr. Clark as she takes up her duties as president of the Har-

bor Area Board. Registration for fall program is currently in progress. Dr. Clark states. Program will be offered in San Pedro, Wilmington, Torrance, Gardena, the Narbonne area, and in Hollywood Riviera, she concluded.

The September board meeting will feature an extended session when the Volunteer Leadership Committee, headed by Mrs. Owen Pharr, will present special training geared to board members.
