TUNA AND MUSHROOM DISH

- 2 t. diced onion
- 2 t. diced celery
- 2/3 cup cream of mushroom soup with equal water.
- 1 can chunk tuna
- 2 hard boiled eggs
- 1/4 cup mushrooms, (sliced)
- 1/4 cup frozen peas (partially cooked)
- Salt and Pepper
- Curry powder (optional)

Saute onion and celery in butter. Dilute mushroom soup with equal water and add to onion and celery. Add remaining ingredients and bring to a boil or until peas are tender. Serve over toast, rice, biscuits or the Starks' favorite-cream puff shells.

NICKEL WEANIE CAKES

Cut frankfurters lengthwise into thin discs. Dip into a thin batter made up from recipe on any biscuit mix package for pancake batter. Fry to a golden brown in a small amount of shortening or bacon fat. Serve with apple sauce or pineapple cubes on colored cocktail toothpicks and glasses of milk. Also appealing as hors d'oeuvres.

BEANS AND PEARL MARINADE

- 1 can Shellie Beans
 - 1 can Kidney Beans
 - 1 can onions (dutch or pearl)
 - 1/3 cup each oil, vinegar and sugar
 - 2 Tbsp. green pepper (diced)
- Drain liquid from all beans with care and wash kidney beans free of thick syrup. Drain onions and combine all ingredients, blended with marinade of oil, vinegar and sugar. Let stand in refrigerator overnight.
