Red Cross Opens Campaign to Aid Donna's Victims

Torrance branch of American Red Cross is accepting contributions for the relief of Hurricane Donna disaster victims, it was announced here today.

Henry Halverson, Torrance branch chairman, reported that "although the actual cost of the relief operation is uncertain until all damage can be completely assessed, it is obvious that emergency and rehabilitation assistance is going to be costly."

aster operations in the organization's history." Volunteers in the devastated area had activated 495 shelters and were giving emergency assistance to some 45,518 evacuees early last week.

Bullock pointed out that in time of disaster, funds allocated by the Federal government are used exclusively to repair roads and bridges and to restore water supplies and other utilities.

"CARE OF human sufferers is the responsibility of the American Red Cross," said

Halverson. "It is estimated that property damage will run into the millions. Home owners lacking adequate resources will be eligible for Red Cross financial assistance in rebuilding, repairing and refurbishing their homes."

It was underlined by the local branch chairman that all such aid is an outright gift from the American people through their American Red Cross.

Bonelli Cites Narcotics Bill, Smog in Drive

Legislation beneficial to California's urban centers is frequently killed in the State Senate's minority-controlled committees, Supervisor Frank G. Bonelli declared this week before the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce.

He leveled the accusation during a debate with Assemblyman Bruce V. Reagan of Pasadena on Prop. 15, the Senate reapportionment measure which will appear on the Nov. 8 ballot. Bonelli favors reapportionment; Reagan is opposed.

The Senate's failure to enact an effective narcotics law and

the bitter fight over the Los Angeles smog bill were cited by Bonelli as two examples of reluctance of the rural dominated Senate to heed the will of the majority of the people.

"THE NARCOTICS bill was referred to a two-year study while the smog measure was not approved until the threat of reapportionment became a reality," Bonelli stated.

Prop. 15 will give the counties of large population more representation in the Senate with Southern California gaining nine new Senators and San Francisco Bay Area three. They

would come from the sparsely populated areas.

Los Angeles would be the big gainer, getting six, with one each going to Orange, San Diego, San Francisco, Alameda, San Bernardino and Santa Clara counties.

BONELLI POINTED out that four San Francisco Bay area counties and eight Southern California counties contain 75 per cent of the population and pay 89 per cent of State taxes, but have only 12 Senators as compared with 28 for the rest of the State.
