Vintage Cars To Parade at Disneyland

New car models of 1961 will be forgotten today at Disneyland when 60 antique automobiles — all pre-1915 vintage — wheel down turn of the century Main Street as the Magic Kingdom presents its Sixth Annual Horseless Carriage Day.

More than 250 participants — owners of the classic cars and their families — will ride in the parade beginning at 2:30 p.m. The auto passengers will be dressed in fashions representing the era of their own car.

OLDEST "horseless carriage" presented will be a one-cylinder 1902 Pierce Arrow, driven by John Carra Jr. of Van Nuys. Its closest rival in age will be a 1905 Buick, owned by Warden Eastwood of Pasadena. "Newest" models are 1915 styles — Dodge, Ford, Overland, Chevrolet, and Studebaker.

Among the most unusual will be a 1909 Pope Hartford, 1912 Daimler, 1909 Hupmobile, 1910 Chalmers, 1913 White, and 1910 Metz.

Also participating in the parade will be the Disneyland Band, Dapper Dan barber shop quartet, and 1900-era motorcycle, and one-wheel bicycle riders.

For early arrivals, 51 of the antiques will be on display in Disneyland's parking lot from 10 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. Nine cars classified as "outstanding" by the Horseless Carriage Club of Southern California will be exhibited on Main Street from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Following the parade, at 3:30 p.m. the 40-voice Pomona Valley SPEBSQSA Chorus (of the Society for Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America) will present a concert at Disneyland's Plaza Gardens.

THS Teacher Given Math Study Grant

Receipt by a Torrance High School teacher of a full year National Science Foundation scholarship was announced by Torrance High School yesterday.

William Ludwig, trigonometry and advanced algebra instructor, has received a full year scholarship, including the remission of tuition, books, and transportation costs. He will attend the modern math course at the University of California at Los Angeles one night a week.

In the modern math course National Science Foundation scholarship winners will study the content and methods of teaching the newer concepts of higher Mathematics.

Ludwig was a recipient of a summer school scholarship offered by the National Science Foundation during the summer of 1960. Three other THS teachers studied advanced method under the auspices of the Foundation. Jack Knapp, instructor of physics and mathematics, studied in the field of mathematics at Highlands University, Las Vegas, N. M. Robert McKnight, Science Department chairman and chemistry teacher, studied radiation in biology in the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque. Alfred H. Smith attended the summer institute for high school teachers of biology at the University of Southern California.
