

## University Women Will Hear Popular Educator

A program of unusual interest in these tense and challenging times will be presented to the members of the Palos Verdes-Rolling Hills Branch of the American Assn. of University Women at a meeting in the Art Gallery Oct. 20. This program with the theme "Service to Our Country," has been arranged by Mrs. Fred C. Allen, Legislative Study Group chairman, who will introduce the speaker, Dr. Frank Sullivan, professor of English at Loyola University in Los Angeles. His subject will be "Responsibilities of Citizenship Today."

Dr. Sullivan is a man of many and varied interests whose activities have ranged from football at Notre Dame, where he studied for one year, to a BA in chemistry from Regis College in his home town of Denver; then on to a teaching position at St. Louis University, followed by a stint of journalism teaching at the University of Dayton. He returned to St. Louis University after obtaining his Ph.D. in medieval and Renaissance language and literature from Yale University.

"On the average, I think I flunk my students if they couldn't speak a language better than the average Russians spoke English," she said. "There were some who were rather fluent, but not many. Some of the guides had difficulty when they were asked questions — and not controversial ones either."

"We met a girl who just graduated from university and said she was going to teach English, having majored in it. We understood her with difficulty and she had trouble understanding any but quite simple phrases."

"I cannot understand why anybody would want to defect to Russia," Mrs. Rische declared. "It was an interesting visit, but I don't know that I could call it enjoyable. It is entirely different. The people are friendly enough, or at least the ones we came in contact with."

"I think that they found it hard to believe that we have any more control over our government than they do. They believe that our government is a threat to peace and that theirs is devoted to peace. All over we saw signs, saying 'Peace to the World.'"

"I saw little that I would want Americans to copy, however, including the products of their educational system. Their system is resigned for the top students and the others fall by the wayside. Their values are shown in the fact that the 'liberal arts' part of Moscow University occupies an old building in the downtown section, while the science part is in a modern skyscraper."

"If there is anything I would copy, it would be the average Russian's apparent love of country (not necessarily the government) and his devotion to the business of improving himself."
