

## Feel Safer With Nixon-Lodge, Life Magazine Says in Editorial

LIFE Magazine this week completed its two-part endorsement of Richard M. Nixon for the presidency.

The magazine, which last week announced its support of the Vice-President's domestic program, in its current issue urges the election of the Nixon-Lodge on the basis of foreign policy.

In an editorial, the magazine noted that in contrast with their stand on domestic problems the difference between the two candidate on world policy was "narrow and the choice is not easy." The magazine said, however, that with Nixon and Lodge in charge of U.S. policy "we shall feel both safer and more hopeful in the enlarging struggle."

LIFE praised the record of the Eisenhower Administration as being "markedly successful" in its conduct of world affairs and said that Nixon "is quite right to take pride in this Eisenhower record, and to claim it is a Republican achievement."

The editorial said that the Republicans "have kept the peace without any serious losses in any place that our arms or influence could reach." It added that this record is "particularly good in contrast with the preceding seven Democratic years, which were years of great Communist gains in Asia and Eastern Europe and the fourth costliest war in our history (Korea)."

LIFE CRITICIZED what it

called the "nervous fringe" or "liberal" wing of the Democratic Party "whose internationalism takes the form of fogginess in general, or gullibility about Communism in particular."

The magazine said that Nixon's policies would be an advance beyond those of Eisenhower "in the direction of toughness, determination and creative imagination." It said that this would be an advance "with continuity rooted in the Eisenhower balance that has kept peace and freedom safe this far."

The editorial noted that Senator Kennedy had "personal style and eloquence," which it termed "great assets for a free

world leader," but that he has failed to show that his "foreign aims and programs are clearly superior to Nixon's."

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## Cigarette Tax Nets \$65 Million During First Year, State Finds

Total receipts from the cigarette tax during the first year ended June 30, 1960, including the floor stocks tax and revenue collected in advance of cigarette distributions from sales of stamps and meter settings, amounted to \$65,230,184 according to Richard Nevins, Fourth District member of the State Board of Equalization.

This total includes a non-recurring floor stocks tax of \$2.7 million collected from retailers on cigarettes in their possession when the tax became effective on July 1, 1959.

NEVINS POINTED out that the tax is prepaid by licensed distributors who purchase stamps or pay for metered impressions which are affixed to each package before they are sold to retailers. On June 30, 1960, there were 288 such distributors in California.

Sales were well above expectations despite the new tax, Nevins stated. Taxable sales to retailers by licensed distributors amounted to nearly 42 billion cigarettes during the 1959-60 Fiscal Year or an estimated 210 packs for every

adult civilian in California. THE ARMED services provided a market for 2 billion tax-free cigarettes. Post exchanges and ships stores purchased 1.4 billion cigarettes from manufacturers and 600 million cigarettes from licensed distributors.

Other tax-exempt distributions for export and sales to common carriers amounted to nearly 1.4 billion cigarettes. In addition, manufacturers gave away over 35 million sample cigarettes during the 12-month period.

Members of the Girls Friendly Society (GFS) of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church will participate in an awards admissions ceremony during the 9:15 a.m. family worship service today. Nearly all of the 37 members, ranging in age from 7 to 16, will receive symbol awards they have earned during the program.

Newly elected officers of the GFS also will be installed by the Rev. Hugh Percy, rector of St. Andrew's, during the ceremony. Officers elected by the girls include Marcia Lamb, president; Susan Schimmin, vice president; Pamela Wilson, secretary; and Anna Alden, treasurer.

Leaders of the Society, who supervise the program of training the girls for church leadership, include Fay Whisnand, Hilda Barnhart, Iola Schadt, Donna Davis, and Millie Wilson. Several of the girls have established eligibility for degrees in GFS and will receive them in special ceremonies at St. Paul's Cathedral in Los Angeles on Nov. 6, Father Percy said.
