

North, South Fight to 13-13 Tie In 'Civil War' Opener

Saxons Stop South Drive on One-Foot Line

The big "Civil War" ended in a Mexican standoff when North and South high schools fought to a 13-13 tie Friday night.

It was a battle of breaks and both teams received an equal share as they kicked-off what should eventually blossom into one of the biggest prep athletic rivalries in the Southland.

An audience of about 4600 at almost-new Saxon Stadium thrilled and chilled as their teams played to a scoreless second half after a wide-open first two quarters of action.

Both teams came so close and yet so far — from wrapping it up and taking home all the marbles late in the 4th period.

First, North advanced to South's nine yard line and

seemed a certain cinch to score. But, every coach's biggest headache—the fumble—intervened and suddenly it was South's turn to tease the ulcer.

THE SPARTANS put together a 62 yard drive which ended—disputedly—on North's half-foot line with just 0:40 remaining to play.

In between, the Spartans played a daring brand of passing football, which, coupled with two key third down runs, literally shook the stands into convulsions.

North's Carey Hubert, a sophomore who played almost brilliantly on both offense and defense, made the key stop on Bob Wehrhan just short of the goal line to preserve the 13-13 tie.

It was another sophomore, South's Phil Fish, who scored the game's (and the series) first touchdown.

In fact, Phil—who just crashed the starting line-up a week ago—tallied both of South's touchdowns while senior fullback Rick Jacobs put North on the scoreboard twice.

Fish's initial TD came on a four yard run which ended a 74 yard march consuming 12 plays after the opening kickoff.

What proved to be an all-important extra-point came on a pass from quarterback Joe Austin to end Mike Andrews.

BUT NORTH came back with its own TD penetration as the Saxons moved 65 yards in nine plays, Jacobs bouncing over from the one. The PAT try failed and it was 7-6.

Coach Bob Shoup's hosts got their first break of the game in the 2nd period, when South fumbled the ball away on the North 23.

The Saxons went all the way in 10 plays. Again, it was Jacobs who supplied the capper.

A 20 yard pass play from Carey Hubert to Pat Lininger, who lateralled to Felix Alviljar, was the drive's standout play. Lininger converted.

South showed its own aerial potency when Joe Austin nailed Fish with a perfect 35 yard pass and Phil trotted into the end zone to tie the count, and end the evening's scoring, just before the half ended.

Both teams were as "high" as could be for the intra-city tussle, and the tackle-to-tackle line play was ferocious.

Offensively, Carey Hubert completed 11 of 11 passes for 129 yards. Carey now has 32 completions for 43 attempts in four games.

North outgained South in net yards, 268 to 187. North led in first downs, 17 to 12.

The tie knocked both teams out of any Bay League con-

1959's NCAA final in Louisville saw the California Bears defeat West Virginia 71-70 in one of the most exciting National Championships games ever recorded.

Last season, the Mountaineers were primed for revenge. The sponsors of Los Angeles' Christmas Classic went out of

tention, as South is still winless in three tries while North is 1-1-1.

Pat Lininger was his team's leading offensive ground gainer, filling in at both halfback spots as well as playing both end positions for the injury-riddled Saxons. He gained 36 yards in 12 carries.

WEHRHAN picked up 56 yards in 15 carries for South to lead the Spartans.

Vance White, a part-time player for the Spartans in their three previous tilts, almost proved to be the game's big hero. He picked North's fumble on the South nine off the ground in the 4th quarter and scampered 25 yards to set up the Spartan's "big scare" penetration.

White also had a key 12 yard gain deep in Saxon territory for a first down to sustain the drive.

TD Should Have Counted—Wehrhan

"All I know is I was over."

So said Bob Wehrhan after his driving, spinning desperation run for victory ended six inches short Friday night as North-South played to a 13-13 stalemate in their first football hook-up.

But Wehrhan, dejected and dissatisfied, will always contend that he dove into the end zone for the "winning" TD on fourth down with 0:40 to play in that wild intricately flare-up.

However, the ruling official declared that Bob was tackled just short of the goal line by North's Carey Hubert, with Wehrhan's knee touching the ground (ending the play) just whiskers from pay dirt.

"His knee hit, then he rolled and twisted into the end zone. It was a smart trick, one you don't see very often," the referee said as

he explained his interpretation of the disputed call in the dressing rooms.

A valiant 63 yard drive by South had carried to North's four yard line in 12 plays.

On 4th down, Wehrhan took a handoff from quarterback Joe Austin and faded back to throw.

But Joe — Wehrhan's intended target — was covered so Bob hightailed it goalward from about the nine. The rest is history — or disputed history.

Actually, it's doubtful if five people in the whole place of about 4600 clearly saw the play. Neither of the coaches had a good vantage point.

Movies of the game may clear up some of the indecision or doubt today.


