Torrance Junior Woman's Club, Marina District, C.F.W.C., assisted in the preparation of Christmas bundles for orphans in Formosa as a part of the program of "Operation Handclasp." These bundles consisted of a washcloth, toothbrush and paste, soap, a toy and used clothing, all wrapped in a large bath towel and secured with safety pins. The bundle for orphans is only a part of "Operation Handclasp" which was started by Commander Donald M. Hanson of the United States Navy.

All manner of things that Americans ordinarily throw away are useful to people of other countries and are being collected and sent overseas by Operation Handclasp. Such things as clean coffee cans, wire coat hangers, slivers of soap, used razor blades, discarded Christmas cards, nylons, as well as used clothing are needed. Sanitary facilities are so scarce that even the slivers of soap, usually thrown away are welcome. The Juniors were told of people in India delighted to receive coffee cans so that they might have something safe from insects to store food in.

The next load of goods will

be shipped out around Nov. 1, but since "Operation Handclasp" is a long term project the collection will be continued throughout the year.
