Southland Junior College Men At Annual Convention at Camino

Twenty-seven Southern California Junior Colleges were represented at the annual Associated Men Students Conference yesterday at El Camino College.

Hosting the confab was the AMS president, Robert J. Kovacev of El Camino College. Beginning at 1 p.m. with registration of the 150 delegates, the students moved into the Campus Theater for the general session.

Opening with the invocation was the Rev. William J. Hollinger of St. Catherine Labourer Church in Torrance. Ed Buchanan, president of the Associated Students of El Camino College welcomed guests, and Dr. Stuart E. Marsee, president of ECC, gave the keynote address. Dr. Marsee spoke on the subject "The Need for Leadership in Today's World."

WORKSHOPS continued from 2:30 to 4:15 with AMS presidents from neighboring colleges heading discussions. The presidents' workshop was headed by Kovacev. A finance workshop was led by Jerry W. Shelley, Fullerton Junior College, and the intramurals workshop was presided over by Dave

Kapps of Santa Monica City College.

Glendale College president, T. R. Anderson, chaired the publicity and public relations workshop with Larry Probert of Orange Coast College leading the service and social activities workshop.

HAMILTON M. Maddaford, assistant director of student personnel at El Camino, headed the advisors' workshop.

Campus tours followed and a general session was to complete the conference before dinner at 6:30 p.m. in the Campus Center. Selection of the site for the Spring SCJCAMC Conference was scheduled at the final session.

County Studies Bids for Area Animal Shelter

Seven bids ranging from \$244,600 to \$266,256 were under study by County Engineer John A. Lambie today for construction of the County's proposed new Animal Shelter No. 3 at Broadway and Victoria Sts. in the Carson area.

According to Supervisor Burton W. Chace, the plans call for construction of an office building, two kennel buildings, a barn and utility building, and landscaping.

The apparent low bidder, according to Chace, is James E. Rowe, of 3200 Sanborn Ave., Lynwood.

THE OFFICE building contains the director's office, a general office, public space, storage, janitor's closet, men's and women's toilets, squad room with showers and lockers, mechanical equipment room and public telephones. The building will be equipped with a complete air conditioning, heating and ventilating system.

Both Kennel Buildings are identical and provide for forty-eight kennels and adjacent exterior runs in each and a mechanical equipment room. The buildings are ventilated and heated. The barn contains two stalls for large animals and a hay-and-grain storage room.

THE UTILITY building contains a veterinarians' room, walk-in refrigerator, work room, cat quarantine, food storage, toilet facilities, and a vehicle wash rack and truck storage area. This building is provided with heating, ventilating, and a unit air cooling system.

All one-story structures contain a total gross area of 11,944 square feet. All floors are constructed of reinforced concrete slabs on grade except for the large animal stalls of the barn, which have exposed earth floors. The exterior and interior walls and partitions of the office building are of wood studs plastered both sides.

EXTERIOR SITE work includes grading, paving, parking and driveways, walks and curbs, water trough in pasture area, planters, exterior lighting, fences, concrete block walls, gates, landscaping and a sprinkler system, flagpole, drainage facilities and connection to public utilities.

According to Chace, a contract will be awarded by the Board of Supervisors as soon as the low bid is confirmed and the successful contractor will be allowed 210 days to complete the job.

Hull, Parents To Discuss School Policies

Parents in the southwest area of the city will meet with School Superintendent J. H. Hull next Wednesday at the Newton Elementary School cafeteria to discuss educational policies of the district.

Mrs. George Shaw, who announced the meeting, said it would not be connected with any organized group, but was just a public meeting of interested parents to discuss the school topics.

Items to be discussed will include combination grades, grading systems, and teacher qualifications, she said.


