

Tartars Can Grasp Tie for Title

VALMORE EXPELLED FROM TEAM

Warriors Border Bound For Season Grid Finale

Working on a two-game winning streak, Coach Norm Verry's Warrior gridgers are set for a coastal tour Saturday when they meet the San Diego Knights in bordertown.

San Diego's 3-5 record isn't any assurance of easy times for El Camino. The Knights have lost the five games by the combined total of only 25 points.

This will be the final game of the season and an important one for both teams as far as position in Metro standings is concerned.

El Camino sports a 3-3 Metro record, in comparison with San Diego's 2-4. A win for the Knights would throw San Diego and El Camino into a tie for fourth place, while a win by the Warriors would clinch that position for El Camino.

San Diego has won the past three games, so the task at hand is no small one.

San Diego's big gun is elusive halfback, Ed Buchanan, a breakaway threat from anywhere on the field. In last year's game, Buchanan scored four touchdowns, including a 90-yard kickoff return which aided the Knights in routing El Camino's homecoming, 36-34.

El Camino's great passer, Sophomore, Ron Veres, put on another aerial spectacular in leading the Warriors to an 18-12 victory, Saturday over East L.A. for the college's first homecoming win in four years.

Playing in heavy showers on a flow field, the veteran signal caller from Torrance High, a 6-ft., 185-pounder, completed 16 of 29 passes for 290 yards and two TDs.

VERES HAS thrown 196 passes in eight games, completing 115 for a 59 per cent completion average. His total yards stand at a smooth 1609 yards or better than 200 per game and 14 yards per completion.

Fourteen of his tosses have gone for TDs.

Both of Veres TD passes Saturday were to end Paul Burleson, who hauled in a 21-yard toss to make the score 12-0 and later went 80 yards with a pass from Veres to sew up the contest in the final quarter.

EL CAMINO played without the services of halfback Jim Valmore, who left the team after failure to report for practice. Filling in for Valmore with an outstanding performance was Bob Pier, former Morningside High star.

Burleson played a spectacular game, catching 8 passes for over 200 yards, and snagging his 8th and 9th TD aeriels of the season.

SEEK REVENGE FOR '59 Favor North by 13 to Saddle Mustangs in 1960 Season Ender

North's sword-swinging Saxons, fresh from a 20-8 felling of Redondo in one of the biggest upsets of the Bay League season last week, will go after underdog Mira Costa tomorrow night in Manhattan Beach to end the season.

Coach Bob Shoup's northerners are shooting to improve on their 3-2-1 record and make at least some amends for last year's dismal inaugural Bay League season.

The Saxons, who uncovered a steady signal caller and field general in reserve Jeff Bell last week, should have two QB's to rely on tomorrow for the season ender against the Mustangs, who've dropped four in

a row since beating Leuzinger early in the season. Last week Michoi was smashed by Inglewood, 25-0. North owns a 19-6 decision over Inglewood.

Bell, who led North to the stunning 20-8 win over Redondo on the Seahawks' home grounds, will probably get the starting call again against the Green and Gold eleven, regardless of the condition of regular QB Carey Hubert's injured ankle.

Bell earned the nod by going all the way and doing a veteran's job on offense and playing most of the time on defense last week as Hubert was unable to suit up.

Torrance Needs Win Over Underdog Lennox

Torrance's title starved Tartars can salt away a piece of the Pioneer League's championship pie tomorrow night by beating Lennox High in the regular-season ender at 8 p.m. at Tartar Stadium.

A victory coupled with a Culver City win over Lawndale would throw the final standings into a three-team tizzy with idle Aviation, and end a 14-year major sport championship dry spell for Torrance.

The Tartars, are hoping to rebound from last week's 38-6 loss to Culver, the school's worst gridiron defeat since 1956.

A HEALTHY Jerry McLean returns to bolster the team's teetering offensive backfield after it was held to its lowest yardage gain of the season by Culver City.

Torrance fell below the 200-plus yards rushing mark for the first time this season when the Centaurs held the locals to just 84 yards running.

McLean, the team's leading ground gainer, sat out the contest with a bad ankle, but he was okay after Tuesday's practice scrimmage session.

Jerry, an 11th grader, has run through Pioneer League foes for 331 yards on 47 carries, for a phenomenal average of 7.0 per crack. Quarterback Howard Taylor has run the ball 21 times for 250 yards on his

patented rollout play. Torrance made too many mental and physical mistakes against Culver City to make any kind of a showing, and if the Tartars are to come through against Lennox, they'll have to revert to their old form.

UP TO THE Culver game, only one team had scored more than once against the Tartars' defense.

If the Tartars' middle line can hold, the defensive ends and linebackers re-learn their assignments, a victory over upset-hopeful Lennox would seem to be assured.

The Tartars blasted the Lancers last year in their only previous meeting, 39-6. Torrance should be at full strength for the game that may lead to a CIF "AA" division playoff berth. If the heavily favored homebreds come through, school officials from the three first place football teams would meet to decide by some means a playoff representative.

The "means" could be by flip of a coin. LAST YEAR, South High and Aviation tied for the championship, but Aviation—which defeated South during the regular season—went to the playoffs.

In '58, North, Morningside and El Segundo tied for the title. North won the playoff nod and subsequently lost a heartbreaker to eventual CIF champion, Long Beach Poly.

Torrance hasn't been in the CIF playoffs since the '57 basketball season, when a second place Bay League entry won a berth.

And Torrance's last football championship came in 1946, the last year the school was in the old Marine League.

CIF Split Into 5 Sections For Football Playoffs

A special administrative committee has announced that the 1960 CIF football playoffs will consist of five groups of eight leagues each — a first-time move on the part of the California Interscholastic Federation.

Last year three playoff groups were formed, with leagues from the San Diego area included. This year, however, San Diego has formed its own athletic section.

Under the five bracket setup, it will be necessary for one team to win three games to claim a division championship.

The "AAA" playoff grouping is the newest division, having been established for the purpose of pitting the eight strongest teams in the CIF (Southern Section) against each other.

The leagues are Moore, Sunset, Citrus Belt, Foothill, Pacific, Channel, Catholic, and Coast.
