

Sheriff in Safety Plea For Holiday

With Christmas and New Year's holidays just around the corner, Sheriff Peter J. Pitches issued a grim reminder to motorists.

"Traditionally, families gather on these festive occasions, which means traveling on our freeways and highways. In 1959, over 40,000 persons lost their lives in motoring accidents—and a considerable portion of these were victims of the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday seasons."

Commenting on the more than 7000 prisoners that will be his "guests" in the Los Angeles County Jail on the Thanksgiving Day, Pitches struck a lighter note. "Many of us recall the legend over a very famous prison—'Abandon hope, all ye who enter here.' This is not the case for our inmates. We make every effort to restore them to society as useful citizens. Proper and just treatment are a part of our everyday jail administration. Thanksgiving will see prisoners celebrating, with tons of turkey and other special foods."

'Y' Mugwumps In Overnight Auto Journey

Three carloads of boys, known to the YMCA as "Mugwumps" and ranging in age from 9 to 12 years, left Torrance for an overnight trip after they attended the "Good Neighbor Breakfast" at the "Y" Oct. 12. The boys were chaperoned by "Mugwump" leaders and assistants.

First stop for the group was Fort Tejon which has been partly restored and in many years past was a camel stop. The second stop which was of great interest to the group was an ice cream plant in Bakersfield, where the boys sampled their favorite flavor of ice cream.

The "Mugwumps" then traveled on to "Shark Tooth Hill" north of Bakersfield, where they collected 150 shark's teeth ranging in size for 1/4-in. to 1 1/2-in. in length. Lunch was eaten in mid-afternoon at the Hart Memorial Park on the banks of the Kern River.

Camp for the night was made six miles from Lake Isabella and supper cooked over an open fire. Chapel was held Sunday morning and then the trek started home across Walker's Pass and Red Rock Canyon.
