With the colorful Christmas recipes, Mrs. Korell has given a teen-age favorite, a Chocolate Upside Down Cake.

La Reta Punch

- 3 c. cider
- 1/2 c. orange juice
- 1/4 c. lemon juice
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 c. water
- 1 pt. gingerale
- 2 tsp. vanilla

Garnish the punch bowl by floating a wreath. Place roses and washed lemon leaves in ring mold. Fill with water and freeze. Unmold and float in punch. The guest cook states that the orange and lemon juice, sugar, and water may be replaced with three 6-oz. cans each of frozen orange and lemon, mixed according to directions.

Poinsettia Tomatoes

On individual salad plates or a platter, make a bed of lettuce or Romaine. Using sharp knife make 3 or 4 cuts across tomato (as in cutting a pie), without cutting entirely through the base. With point of knife cut skin surface back to base. Leaves or petals are laid back. Drop mayonnaise on center.

Bunch of Grapes Salad

On back of lettuce or Romaine leaf, place a fresh or canned pear half. Coat pear with cream cheese blended with a little mayonnaise. Cover entire pear with red seeded grape halves. Garnish at narrow end of pear with parsley sprig.

Chocolate Upside Down Cake

- 3/4 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. butter
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 c. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 1/2 tsp. cocoa

Cream sugar, butter, milk. Sift together flour, salt, soda, baking powder, cocoa. Add to first mixture. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. Pour mixture into 9 x 9 pan. Spread with 1/2 c. chopped nuts. Mix 1/2 c. white sugar, 1/2 c. brown sugar, 1/2 c. cocoa and spread over mixture. Pour 1 1/4 c. boiling water over all. Bake 30 to 35 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Turn out upside down. Cut into squares and serve with whipped cream.
