An ocean full of fish, but boats without fishermen, has become the winter season lament at Redondo Fisherman's Wharf, according to Gordon McRae, chief of Redondo Pleasure Fishing fleet.

The "bottom fish special," which leaves the wharf at dawn and returns in the afternoon, has been providing passengers with regular catches of chilies, ling cod, and a large amount of rock cod, McRae says.

Half-day and all-day surface boats are bringing back reasonable catches of bonito, barracuda and bass. Barge fishing is providing mackerel and bonito, with wharf enthusiasts catching halibut and bonito.
