


North Undefeated In Tournament

Nearly 1000 Watch as Four Torrance Cage Teams Vie

Mike Bowman, 13, of Torrance, was awarded the top gold trophy for first place prone rifle shooting during the year 1960 by The San Pedro Junior Rifle Club at the Gaffey Street range, it was announced today by Miss Ann Frickman, instructor for the club.

He has won many medals, ribbons, emblems and certificates for excellence in marksmanship and competes annually in the California State Junior Championship Rifle Matches. Young Bowman is a vice-president in the junior club.

BOB RANDLE, 13, also of Torrance, won second place standing gold trophy in the same club event. A real sharpshooter, Randle won two medals recently at San Gabriel,

shooting the four-position matches in the State Junior Championships. His medals were for Marksman Class and one was awarded for the Governor Rifle Match event.

He has medals, trophies and emblems also for smallbore rifle marksmanship.

RIFLE classes for youngsters are conducted on the San Pedro Target Range on Gaffey Street every Saturday and Sunday by Miss Frickman, an instructor in rifle, pistol and Hunter Safety for the National Rifle Assn. of America and the California Department of Fish and Game.

Girls and boys 12-to-18 years of age may enroll in the rifle school when a parent or legal guardian brings the student to the range, on Saturday at 9:30 a.m. or Sunday the same hours.

Wanna Buy A Horse?



J. P. Morgan once said that if a person had to inquire the price of a yacht he couldn't afford to own one. To some extent, the same is becoming true of the race horse. At the recent summer yearling sales owners paid an average of \$11,500.00 for yearlings, and at some tracks, claiming prices range as high as \$20,000. When a horse is claimed he is at least in training and may earn something for his new owners. With the yearling the price paid is only the beginning. He must be sent to an equine kindergarten to be trained and, unless the owner has his own farm, boarded, because stall space at the race track is limited to horses ready to run. This year's yearling will not be ready to race until January 1. The board bill and training expense will run about \$400 a month, plus shipping costs, veterinary expense, insurance, equipment, etc. Size, temperament, bucked shins, coughing, and the accidents to which all children are one are apt to delay the day when the young racer starts earning his keep.
