

Area Boy Scouts to Be Guests At Civic Symphony Show Tonight

Because eight "Boy Scouts" were so enthusiastic about the last concert of the Civic Symphony that they didn't want to go home, Elyse Aehle, the conductor, has invited all Scouts as her guests to the coming concert tonight at 7:30 at Redondo High School Auditorium.

It happened this way: At the last concert, Scout Troop No. 863 from St. James church was color guard for the salute to the flag and, although it is customary for the young people, who assist at the symphony, to leave early, this

group remained to the end. WITH BEAMING faces they announced that they had listened to the whole program and that "It was super." That decided Maestro Aehle that they should have the honor of being color guard at the coming concert and that the program would be planned especially for them and all the other young people as well as for adults.

WITH THE thought that all parents will be interested in what these young people have

accomplished, the following amazingly gifted teen-agers have been chosen to play solos in the "Carnival of Animals" by Saint Saens. Louise Di Tullio, who won the Philharmonic contest for flutists in November and now plays First Flute in that orchestra, will play "The Bird." Eileen Romm, who was recently featured in Los Angeles as soloist playing her own composition, and David Pinto, young pianist from Torrance, will play "The Pianistes."

BERNARD BLAU, who is

leading cellist in two youth orchestras in Los Angeles, will play "The Swan." Solo parts of the "Elephant" and the "Cock" will be played by Russell Black and Charles Zila, senior soloist members of the Civic Symphony.

Ronald Romm, 13 year-old trumpeter who has been featured soloist with the Long Beach Band and several orchestras, will play the difficult solo La Virgen de la Marcarna by Mendez.

JUDGE JOHN A. Shidler will narrate the stories of the

various numbers on the program which will also include the Overture to "Hansel and Gretel" by Humperdinck, the prelude to the third act of "Lohengrin" by Wagner, Polovetzian Dances by Borodin and the traditional Greensleeves and Adeste Fideiis.

Following the program the young people and their parents will have an opportunity to talk with the musicians.

B-70 Bomber Drawings Go To Manufacturing Section

A major milestone has been passed in the Air Force B-70 program with the release to the factory of eleven thousand basic engineering drawings required to build the first prototype of the 2000 mile an hour bomber, North American Aviation, Inc., the prime contractor announced today.

Release of the last of 11,202 drawings was on the scheduled date set three years ago when the program first was activated, stated Jack Jones, Vice President and B-70 Manager for North American. "It is significant because it means construction of this steel and titanium airplane can proceed on schedule."

JONES SAID the more than eleven thousand drawings represented a total of over 6,000,000 engineering man-hours including almost 10,000 hours of wind tunnel testing that has gone into the design and development of what he termed the "greatest airplane ever conceived."

Stretched end to end the drawings would reach for more than 15 miles and would cover five acres, he said.

THE B-70 DESIGNED to cruise its entire intercontinental mission at speeds of 2000 miles an hour, three times faster than the speed of sound, has been described as opening the door to an entire new era of aeronautics. Constructed almost entirely of stainless steel honeycomb material the airplane can withstand temperatures of more than 500 degrees.

Following initial award of the contract in December, 1957, the program was redir-

ected to construction of a single prototype last year and subsequently reinstated to a full weapon system program in October. First flight of the prototype B-70 is scheduled for late in 1962.

Students to Visit Bank On Thursday

Garden Checklist

1. Plant deciduous fruit trees this month. Also grapes, cane berries and strawberries.
2. Plant flowering quince for some delightful early color. A hedge of quince makes a thorny and impassable boundary.
3. Roses that are not planted the day they are purchased should have their roots covered with moist soil.
4. Beware of collecting your own leaf mold. You may be collecting a sackful of trouble from oak root fungus at the same time.
5. If you haven't already, prune roses this month. At the same time strip off any remaining leaves that have not fallen of their own accord. Clean up fallen leaves around roses.
