

Charles M. Carr Will Lecture Next Tuesday

The universal law of good will be brought out in a free public lecture on Christian Science to be given in Redondo Beach next Tuesday, Jan. 10, by Charles M. Carr of Montclair, New Jersey.

Mr. Carr, a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship, will speak in the Church Edifice, 527 South Broadway at 8:00 p.m. under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist. The subject of his lecture will be "How Christian Science Can Help You."

A native of Melrose, Mass., Mr. Carr received his education in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He withdrew from business in 1942 to devote his full time to the public practice of Christian Science. Ten years later he became an authorized teacher of Christian Science. He served from 1944 to 1954 as Christian Science Committee on Publication for the State of New Jersey.

32 Precincts Set Up for Board Vote

Thirty-two precincts will be used in the April 18 election for members of the Torrance Board of Education, local trustees learned Tuesday night.

The same precincts will be used by the Torrance Unified School District to elect board members and by El Camino Junior College for selection of its trustees. Costs of the election will be shared by the two school districts.

Precincts will be located at all 30 Torrance elementary schools and at El Retiro Park and the Home Savings and Loan Co. building.

Cost of holding the election is about \$3500, the board was told.

Work Begins On Avalon in Carson Area

Supervisor Burton W. Chace said that pavement widening on the east side of Avalon boulevard from 190th Street to Elsmere Drive in the Carson area will begin this week.

When completed, it will help the flow of traffic in the growing Carson area, Chace said.


