Lomita Water Improvement Receives OK

Approval of plans and specifications for water system improvements in Waterworks District No. 13, Lomita, was announced Tuesday by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The work includes construction of 3400 lineal feet of water mains in an area bounded on the north by 236th St., on the east by Arlington Ave., on the south by 240th St., and on the west by Crenshaw Blvd. Chace said the work represents the second phase of reconstructing the water distribution system under contract in the service area of the former Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 2, which County Waterworks District No. 13 acquired.

When completed, customers will receive water at a pressure of 60 to 70 pounds per square inch.

Pacific Telephone Allots About \$100 Million for 1961 Projects

Pacific Telephone will spend about \$100,000,000 in Los Angeles County this year for new buildings, equipment and improvements in telephone service.

James S. Cantlen, vice president and general manager of Pacific made the announcement this week after reviewing his company's scheduled growth and progress for 1961.

He said the entire economy in the Southland and the State will benefit from this huge expenditure, pointing out that it will provide jobs in construction and allied trade and that upwards of \$100,000,000 will be spent with California businesses for various kinds of goods and services.

CUSTOMERS, he said, will benefit through new and more modern equipment which this year he expects will carry almost 7,000,000,000 (7 billion) local and long distance phone calls.

Cantlen said his firm last year added 100,000 telephones to its lines, ending the year with 2,350,000, an increase of 4 1/2 per cent over 1959 or about one phone for every two county residents. He expects the number of phones to increase by about the same number in each of the next two years.

Biggest local construction under way is the eight level communications center at 42 South Grand Ave. in downtown Los Angeles for which land and construction costs are tabbed at \$5,700,000. After completion next May it will be filled with \$25,000,000 worth of electronic gear to handle all forms of communications, television, business data transmission, teletypewriter, as well as a telephone.

AS AN example of customer service improvements, Cantlen pointed to the steady expansion of direct distance dialing with which a customer can dial his own cross country calls.

During 1961 this new fast service will be made available to an additional 175,000 Pacific customers, he said, with 98 per cent of all subscribers in the county to have this service by the end of this year.

As one highlight of 1960 Cantlen mentioned the communications network arranged by Pacific together with other Bell System companies for the National Democratic Convention which, he said, constitutes the largest concentration of temporary communication equipment ever assembled in one spot in the West.

"BY 1970," he said, "we will be servicing double the number of telephones we serviced just five years ago."

He said skyrocketing population increases are accountable for Pacific's continued growth, pointing out that his company has spent an average of \$100,000,000 a year for service expansions since the end of World War II.

"The county is growing at the rate of 1600 people every 30 days," he said.

THE COMPANY'S big task, as Cantlen sees it, is to expand fast enough to prepare for the growth and service improvements of tomorrow while maintaining today's high service standards economically.

"We forecast that by 1966 7,150,000 persons will be living in the county with almost 4,500,000 of them customers of Pacific," he said.
