

# Legislature Organized; Bills on State Problems Flood Both Houses

 The job of organizing ourselves to carry on the work of the current session is now well under way. Both houses have picked their officers without contest. The Assembly Rules Committee, which controls the purse-strings of that house and has other broad powers, has been named. Chairmen and other members of the various standing committees are selected, and planning their tasks.

In his message to the joint meeting of both our houses the Governor enumerated a long list of items which he recommended for our consideration and action.  
 CHOOSING education as his number one topic, he moved through stiffer narcotics controls to juvenile custody problems, from a "hard look" at aid to needy children to more liberal aid to the aged.  
 Public health, election laws and reapportionment, state

government reorganization and water costs" were included. Labor-management relations, civil rights, and housing needs were also touched upon. In conclusion, he promised a balanced budget with no new taxes, and even suggested elimination of the sales tax on prescription medicines.  
 EVEN BEFORE delivery of the message was completed, bills had been introduced which relate to some of the subjects included. Two Assem-

bly measures which would impose far stiffer penalties on narcotics violations, especially those involving sales to minors, were dropped in the hopper. Senate measures on the same topic also were introduced.  
 Sales tax exemptions on drugs are the subject matter of two bills already introduced. One would follow the Governor's suggestion, and limit the exemption to prescription medicines only. It is estimated this would lift the tax from other

drugs, eye glasses and other artificial aids to the handicapped as well, at an approximate savings of \$17 million annually. The other, a Senate bill, would lift the tax from other drugs, eye glasses and other artificial aids to the handicapped as well, at an approximate saving of \$17 million annually.  
 PROMPT RELIEF for school districts with urgent building problems would be made possible by a measure to make available \$30 million in state loans in advance of sale of the bonds approved by voters last June. Also a measure to step up total monthly alloca-

tions for loans from \$10 to \$12 million was dropped in the hopper.  
 Election law is another field in which several bills have already appeared. One would tighten up requirements for reporting candidates' campaign contributions and expenses. Another would speed up counting of absentee ballots. Still another would restore cross-filing on both party tickets at the primary, which was eliminated at the last regular session in 1959.  
 ANOTHER ATTEMPT to revise our cumbersome and detailed state Constitution would be made by a bill which would

create a state-wide commission to review and rewrite the whole document. The group would be required to report by 1963. This is the sixteenth proposal for such revision which have been introduced in the last quarter century.  
 Included among the 500 or more other bills so far put across the desk are almost as many subjects, and hundreds of others will be covered in measures yet to come. Bills to regulate advertising more strictly are already in. So is one to provide tax exemption for bomb shelters.  
 Driver licenses would be affected by still another. Collective bargaining, logging truck
