


Torrance Dumps Lawndale, 74-32

Coach Uses Bench; Each Player Scores

Coach Will Boerger's Tartars breezed through a 74-32 win over the young Lawndale High quintet here Tuesday afternoon as every player on the Tartar bench got into the scorebook.

The hapless Lawndale crew were out of the game from the beginning and trailed 28-16 at the end of the first quarter.

Starting Tartars were benched for much of the game after the first quarter as a total of 13 cagers hit the hoop for at least one point.

FORWARD Bob Weister led the scoring for the winners with a 15-point total. Bill Roberts, who has been leading the Bay League with his scores, settled for six points as he concentrated on rebounds, doing what Coach Boerger called a "hang up job on the boards."

Torrance gets a respite from the Bay League contests this week, but will keep in shape by meeting Lakewood here Friday night.


IN OTHER Bay League games Mira Costa will be at Hawthorne, and Leuzinger at Morningside.
