South High's ace hoopster, Joe Austin, was at the top of the heap in the Bay League scoring as action resumed Friday following the lay-off for finals.



Device Wins Award for Torrance Man

T. F. McIntire, of 19917 Donora Ave., has been named one of two winners of a \$25 bonus under the Los Angeles Board of Public Works' incentive program for a suggestion made to the department.

McIntire, a carpenter, with L. J. Stribling of Los Angeles, a truck operator, teamed up to design an ingenious device which helps stabilize slopes and banks in grading operations.

The pair worked out a system of pipes, valves, and rubber hose by which water and air are driven through a pipe to force a small hole through the sloping earth and thus permit the easy insertion of "dead man" rods. A hole nearby is filled with concrete which anchors the stabilizing rods.

Ben R. Paris, director of the Bureau of Street Maintenance, said the device would save about \$500 the first year of its use.


