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Bakersfield Carrying Torrid Win Streak Into 2nd Round

Bakersfield College won its fifth straight Metropolitan Conference basketball game last week end and now is topped in the won-loss column with a record of 6-1. The Bakersfield crew took Long Beach CC into camp last Friday and Santa Monica on Saturday. The crowded second place spot is shared by San Diego, East Los Angeles, and Long Beach and all three sport a 5-2 record.

Coach Hilbert Crosthwaite's San Diego JC five was the only other Metropolitan Conference outfit to win both scheduled games last week, having beaten Santa Monica 74 to 56 and East LA 94 to 75. East LA, Long Beach, El Camino, and Valley College split their two games series over the week end, while Harbot and Santa Monica lost two.

Diego and Bakersfield feature at Bakersfield brings together two of the topnotch JC basketball crews in the State and the game's outcome should give some indication as to which team will be in the winner's circle come the last of February. The two teams tied for the flag in 1960 with Bakersfield the playoff winner to represent the Metro Conference in the State tourney. San Diego beat Bakersfield in the first round game 73 to 43 for the Renegades' only 1961 defeat. Since this game, San Diego has lost only to Long Beach and El Camino.

The big scoring leaders for San Diego include forward Art Williams, forward Richard Flannery with 103 points in seven games, center Walter Ramsey, 73 points and forward Forrest Githero who has tipped in 87 points for the season. Bakersfield's big offensive guns are forward Art Keller, 67 points; center Steve Merta who has a 59 record in seven games, and center Orville El-

kings. Game time is 8 p.m. and it should be a near capacity crowd for the big Bakersfield basketball pavilion.

FRIDAY night's big feature pairing East LA at Long Beach will bring together two of the big Metro scorers—forward Aron Carmichael of Long Beach CC and East LA's Felix Patterson. Carmichael is fourth in Conference scoring with 136 points and a 19.4 point average, while Patterson sports a 16.4 average for seven games. East LA scored an impressive 53 to 50 win over Long Beach in their first round game.

METROSPORT ... John Marinovich of Harbor College is leading local scorers in the Metropolitan Conference with a seven-game average of 19.7. Jack Runyan, M. Camino's flashy forward has scored 122 points in 7 games for a 17.4 average. Two other Harbor cagers, forward Charlie Campbell and center Dave Turk, carry point averages of 12.7 and 12.4 respectively. El Camino's Roy Wey is hitting an average of 16 points while teammates Joe Cattivera and Ted Sprague are hitting 11 and 9 respectively. In seven league games, Harbor has amassed 446 points while giving up 240. El Camino has hit for 355 points and watched their opponents gather 244.

FRIDAY GAMES mark the opening of the final round of the 1961 schedule with the first week's games featuring East LA at Long Beach on Friday night, and San Diego at Bakersfield on Saturday night. Other feature games on Friday bring together Santa Monica at Valley, El Camino at Bakersfield, and San Diego at Harbor.

In winning its two games last week, San Diego JC continued its scoring spree by ringing up 168 in the two games for a total of 549 points and an average of 78.4 points, defensively, Long Beach CC is still the stingiest, holding its opponents to a total of 431 points and 61.6 per game.

BIG individual scorers last week included Valley's Jack Hirsch with 33 against El Camino and 19 against Long Beach for a total of 52 points in the two games. Hirsch currently leads the Conference athletes with 194 and 27.7 average. The fabulous Art "Ham-bone" Williams, top-rated San Diego JC forward, had himself a real high scoring week end by hitting 31 points against Santa Monica and 34 at East LA's expense for a total of 65 points for the duo.

Williams is second in the scoring department for the Metro with 182 points and a 26 game average.

Other top scorers in two games for the week included Bakersfield's Mark Hasen with 45 points, Lynton Hodge of Long Beach with 40, Louis Hood of East LA with 44 and Harbor's Charlie Campbell with 38.
