### American S-L Loan Totals At New High

Real estate loans in force of American Savings and Loan Assn. totaled a record \$231 million in 1960. Executive Vice President William Balopole revealed yesterday. This reflects an increase of 26 per cent over the 1959 total of \$183 million in loans.

Mortgage loan accounts numbered 20,900 at year's end, added Balopole.

"NOT ONLY was 1960 the greatest lending year in history," he said, "but our greatest growth year in assets and reserves as well. Total resources reached an all-time high of \$263 million as compared to \$219 million at the end of 1959. Similar reserves now over \$23 million, an increase of \$4 million over the previous year's total of \$19 million."

Along with the growth represented by these figures and the increased activity in savings accounts and real estate loans, 1960 saw the completion of six newly constructed or remodeled facilities to take the place of existing facilities of American Savings 12 savings headquarters.

This modernization program is continuing with work currently underway on a new addition joining with present savings headquarters for the American Savings and Loan Assn. in Whittier.
