 todial schedules and possibility of contracting with private business for part of work; (d) publications program; (e) industrial techniques to see whether some procedures could be adapted; (f) number of forms and reports required.
 3. Charge \$3 for those taking adult education programs.
 4. Do not increase present class size of 34 per class.
 5. Simplify present budget reports.
 6. Retain (a) retain shop and homemaking programs, but consider ways to avoid transporting students to class; and (b) driver training, but consider contracting for some of the service.

THE COMMITTEE report noted:

"We believe the people, business, and industry in Torrance are prepared to support an adequate school program without frills. The school board and administration should take a positive step in effective, substantial economies in the administrative and service area; also those frill areas which do not affect the basic education program. We feel that the board should make it known to the public prior to the override election that it is the intention of the board and administration to effect substantial economies in the system."

"Unless some economies can be made, even the 50 cents proposed in the school support election, will not last three years. The school district will screen all suggestions for economy, picking those which will do the least damage to the educational program for Torrance boys and girls," Dr. J.H. Hull said.

Full text of the report will be released as soon as the board has had a chance to study the details, officials said.

Exhibit of New Space-Age Gear Due at Dorn's
