Capone Once Owned Stable TRA Says It Couldn't Happen Now

Al Capone once raced horses. He owned not a stable but a string of stables operated by "fronts."

It can't happen today — at least at a TRA track, thanks to some tough policies laid down by Spencer J. Drayton who, 15 years ago, launched the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau.

"And", Drayton said, "Thoroughbred racing today doesn't permit this kind on the track as spectators. The Appalachian mob, the Mafia boys, and other celebrated hoodlums may still have their ringside and box seats at other sporting events but they are persona non grata at TRA tracks."

NOT ONLY have the "Trigger Mikes", the "Joey A's", the "Big Franks" and others of their ilk been ejected from race track box seats and dining rooms but the courts have upheld the right of the race track to refuse them admission.

"The formation of the TRPB in 1946 was not because racing was harassed by scandal," Drayton recalls, "It was an almost inevitable development that came with the unification of racing. Racing had become a billion dollar business and the race track operators were quick to realize that the big money involved was a tempting target for that element that was, and still is, harassing other sports."

FROM THE beginning Drayton operated with a no-holds-barred mandate and a half-million dollar budget and before the TRPB was a year old it was apparent that it meant business and spelled

trouble for the hoodlum and racket operators. A rash of ringers in the previous year indicated the need for a foolproof system of horse identification. Today over 90,000 Thoroughbreds can be identified by checking a simple tattoo brand on their upper lip.

SIMILARLY, it was thought advisable to know who was among racing personnel and a fingerprint program including everyone from official to "hot walker" was instituted. A Code of Standards, in effect a forthright statement of ethical policy for race track operation, was suggested and promptly adopted by the TRA. This self-imposed code is the only one of its kind in professional sports today.

Looking back Drayton, who in 1960 was elected executive vice-president of TRA, observes: "Ours was not so much a cleanup job as it was a protective program. Whatever credit is due should go to the race track operators who had the responsibility and foresight to recognize the need for this protection and spend \$7,000,000 to insure it."
